THORNHILL—"If we didn't get into the new community Centre right away, there wouldn't have been ice time available," says President Karen Gammage.

But the organizers of Thornhill's young Figure Skating Club did make their bid for ice time early, and are glad they did.

This year's membership of 450, after only two years in operation, is clear proof of the interest in figure skating among Thornhill residents.


Like other figure skating clubs in the area, the Thornhill club is staffed entirely by volunteers, with only the professional instructors receiving salaries. Seventy to eighty mothers contribute their time to help the club go. While other clubs hold annual Ice Carnivals, however, the still-young Thornhill group have decided to opt for bi-annual displays, concentrating instead on inter-club competitions.

As well, President Gammage reports the club has been granted permission to entertain crowds between periods at Thornhill Thunderbird hockey games.

"This will give the children some incentive towards having a good solo", says Gammage.

Many children get their first thrill, their first spill, in short their first taste of the ice, thanks to Thornhill Figure Skating.


