

# Gang talked too much

They got a lift, but the driver overheard them talking about the stolen car and telephoned police after dropping them off.

Charged are: Steven Sullivan, 17, Agincourt, possession over \$200 and break, enter and theft; Harvey Snow, 17, Willowdale, theft and possession over \$200, and break, enter and theft; Cynthia Mueller, 18, Willowdale, possession over \$200 and break, enter and theft; and a 15-year-old juvenile on all three counts.

# Rink lockers ransacked

CONCORD — Playing hockey continues to be an expensive outing for those in the area.

For the third time in as many weeks, a group of players reported the theft of money from their wallets from a locker room at Double Rinks Arena on Jane St.

This time it was \$300 belonging to Joseph Errington and 13 others, who were on the ice from 8 p.m. to 9 p.m., Feb. 21.

Wilson-Niblett Motors Ltd., Yonge St., Richmond Hill, reported \$1,100 worth of damage done to four vehicles on their lot.

Police said the damage had been caused by someone ramming a vehicle into them.
