# School tax set

AURORA - York County board of education gave final approval to its 1977 budget Monday night, and not a moment too soon.

The \$74.1 million estimates were to be delivered to the ministry of education, Tuesday, Mar. 15, the deadline set by the ministry.

The budget lists \$38,500,000 for elementary school purposes and \$35,600,000 for secondary, up \$6 million from last year's \$68 million outlay.

At the same time, the board approved the 1977 requisition for the nine area municipalities. This comes to \$18,854,522 for elementary school purposes and \$17,796,289 for secondary school programs.

A board report showed the combined county rate up 9.4 per cent over last year's.

However, it was also pointed out the rates were only estimates as the individual area municipalities were

A breakdown of the rate estimates shows Richmond Hill with an estimated mill rate of 19.232, up 9.5 per cent over

Average for the region is 9.4 per cent. Other area rates: Vaughan, 17.697, up 9.6; Markham, 18.192, up 8.4; King, 21.374, up 9.6; Whitchurch-Stouffville, 19.609, up 9.6.

Individual requisitions for elementary schools show Richmond Hill's \$2,863,279 to be third highest behind Markham and Vaughan.

Markham has a requisition of \$5,838,218, while Vaughan's is

In the secondary school category, Richmond Hill's requisition is \$2,728,133.

Markham is assessed \$5,508,529. Vaughan's total is \$3,055,168.


Both the budget and requisitions were approved without comment.





This is what Ontario is doing to make certain you receive it.

We have a law in Ontario which permits any pregnant woman, married or not, to take a 17-week unpaid leave of absence from work to have her baby. This law covers part-time as well as full-time employees, provided that they have been working for the same employer for at least 63 weeks before the expected date of birth.

When she returns to work, the new mother is guaranteed the right to her former position or to a comparable position with no loss of seniority or benefits at the same salary.

Naturally, pregnancy does not prevent an employee from being dismissed for valid reasons not connected with pregnancy, but pregnancy alone cannot be the cause of dismissal where an employee is eligible for leave.

An expectant mother is required to give two weeks' notice in writing of the day she intends to leave. She is entitled to begin her leave any time within 11 weeks before the baby's birth but she must take at least six weeks of her leave afterwards. If the employer wishes the employee to begin her leave before she wants to do so. the employer must prove that she is unable to perform her normal duties adequately.

The employee is eligible for Unemployment Insurance

benefits during her pregnancy leave (even if she does not intend to resume work when her leave expires) if she had at least 20 weeks of ensured employment during the year before the birth. At least ten of the 20 weeks should have fallen between the 30th and the 50th weeks before the
