For the past 30 years, the Sportsmen's Show has been the signal for all outdoors people to ready themselves for a new season.

This year the show opens its gates on Friday, March 18 and remains open until March 27.

Daily entertainment in the arena includes, naturally, the retriever trials; a dog that catches frisbees should make a hit with the kids; and there is a clown with his pony. The Mike Curb Congregation will provide entertainment every evening with afternoon shows on the weekends. Every afternoon there are moose and duck calling championships in the arena.

Trount pond

The Ministry of Natural Resources will be on hand again with the mini-zoo that includes animals, birds and fish that one might expect to see in Ontario.

The popular trout fishing pond allows show visitors an opportunity to catch live trout to take home. This pond is operated by the Toronto Anglers and Hunters Association who also operate the championship casting pool during the show.

Photography

Henry's, the camera people, are sponsoring a wildlife photography exhibit and will show camera buffs how to use blinds and other techniques to capture animals on film.

For the angler, I suggest he take a look at the new type of fishing rods available.

Called the 'ugly stik', by Shakespeare, the rods are a combination of fibreglass and graphite, and are supposed to be the world's strongest rods.

Combined with a light weight, the decent price should make it a hit with Ontario fishermen. I understand that they are on display at Conroy's booth, located near the casting pool.

Kayak

Not long ago, I had the pleasure of watching a kayak being built from scratch. I had no idea that in modern times someone would take such care and pride in their work as do John and Gill Jacob. This kayak is built from selected pine ribbing and covered with canvass. Designed for fast touring of coastal, lake or river waters, this craft will hold two people and enough supplies for ten days. One of these boats will be on display at Black's camping outfitters, somewhere to the left of the main entrance along the south wall.

Reality

Let's leave the Sportsmen's Show now and return to reality. I have just returned from the South River-Port Loring area. Deep snow has just about finished the deer herds up there.

In one forty mile deer yard area, a population of 22,000 animals has been reduced to about 10,000 and the winter is not over yet.

The animals surviving are in such bad shape that few will bear young ones this spring. Survival of the entire herd is very much in doubt. Had we been able to harvest half of those animals by hunting last fall, most of them would have had a chance to survive until spring, and being healthy, they would have produced many fawns.

I, personally, would rather see a deer shot than watch it slowly starve to death. Any comments on this from you anti-hunting groups?
