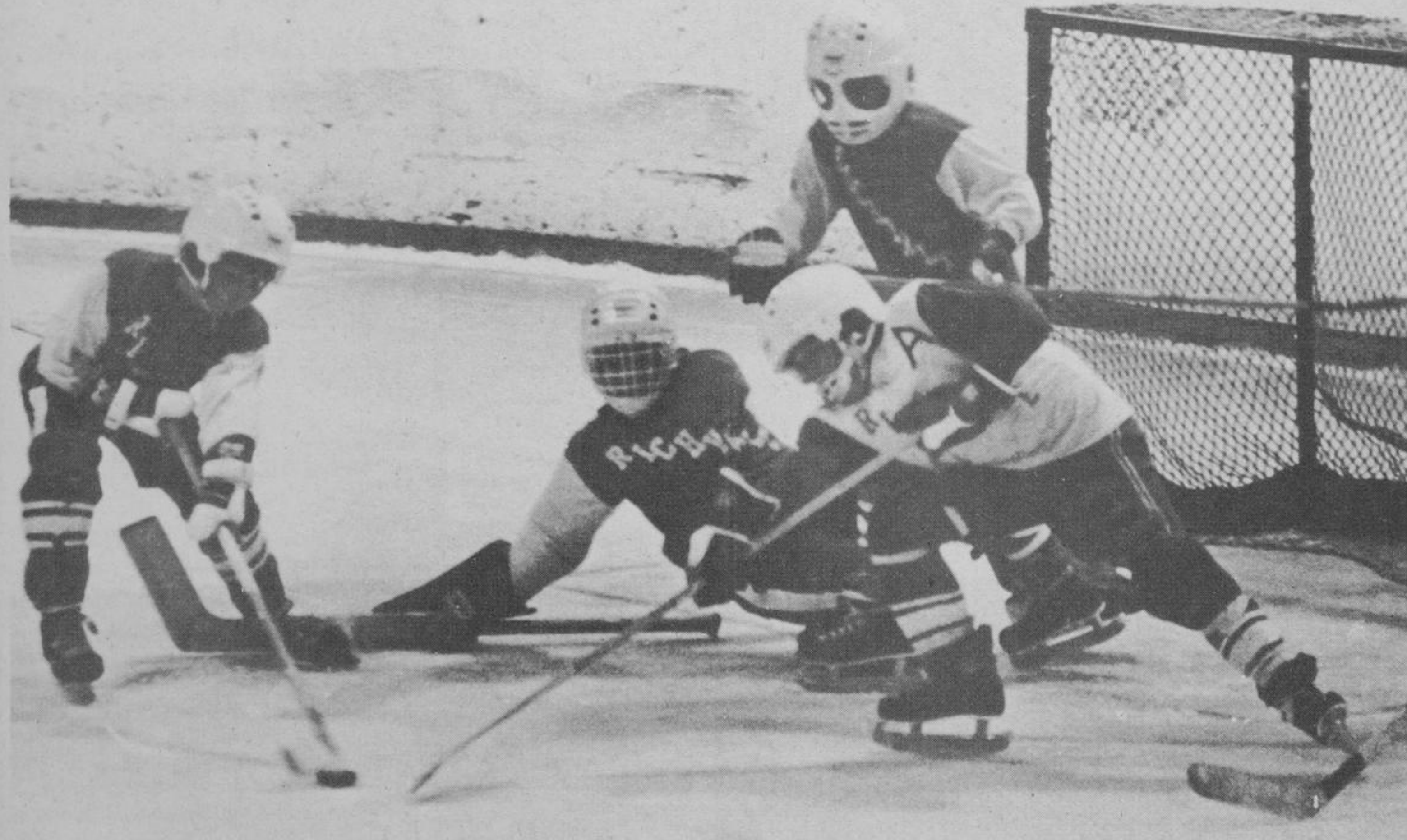

Buy some tackle

There is one sure way to keep your kid out of trouble - buy him some fishing tackle.

Don't buy some of the junk you see advertised occasionally on the back cover of some magazine, 355 pieces for only \$12.95 or so.

Buy tackle that would be good enough that you would use it yourself. Poor tackle only discourages the new angler.

Encourage him
After you have bought the gear you must add plenty of encouragement and expert advice, if available. Spend some time exploring and drive the new enthusiast to the fishing grounds.

Never start a child fishing from a boat; kids become restless after a few minutes if there is no action, and they must walk around, exploring the area.

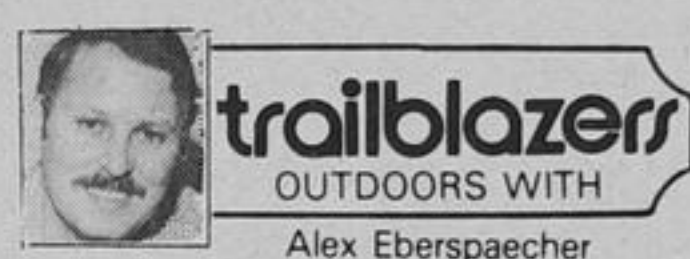
Boring
Naturally, in a boat this is impossible and, talking to a few non-fishermen, I have found that most of them had their first boring experiences in a boat.

In my estimation, the spinning rod with an open-faced reel is the best equipment. Not only is the tackle easy to manipulate but it is available in all price ranges and sizes.

The rod should be of hollow glass rather than the solid type and it should have a cork handle. Get one that has a reel-seat that can be screwed onto the reel. Good starter rods are available for \$12.00 and up.

Easy casting
The reel, as the name implies has an open, exposed spool. Not only is casting very easy but also the line easily untangles if this should ever become necessary.

On an open-faced spinning reel the spool remains stationary during the cast and, as only the line flows off without spinning the reel, there is no chance of tangling the line around the reel. A second type of reel available is the closed-faced spin cast reel.

Similar to the former, this reel has a casing around the spool, preventing the line from being exposed. Although this is still a good choice, it is my idea that the new-comer can handle the open-faced reel more easily.

Common error
One common error most newcomers make in their tackle is in the selection of line. Stay away from the nameless brands sold in department stores. Eight pound test line is sufficient for all our Ontario fishing as no fish will break such a line if the drag on the reel is properly set.

Right lures
Take care in buying lures. Most reputable manufacturers have some basic simple lures that will catch fish. However, there are thousands of lures displayed in stores that are intended to catch the novice, not the fish.

Some of the colours are actually dazzling to the eye! Garbage, if you consider that most fish are colourblind.

Hopefully I have given you some ideas on how to get your child started, the rest is up to you.

Remember to buy your tackle at a reputable tackle shop, not one of the large department stores.

Take the advice of the expert you usually find in the good tackle store, as he usually is an avid fisherman.

Encourage them
Oh, yes! Encouragement. Forget about the fishing if you can't find the time to spend with your son or daughter.

Unless you suggest that he should go fishing and then take him, the tackle will collect dust in a cupboard and all your money and, perhaps his life will be wasted.

Propose bubble roof in Hill tennis courts

RICHMOND HILL — A proposal to construct an inflatable bubble over the four tennis courts at Crosby Park to provide for year-round tennis was deferred last week by the Richmond Hill parks and recreation committee.

The bubble would cost an estimated \$160,000 and would be financed by a "group of businessmen" who would require a 10-year operating lease.

Requesting permission to construct the bubble were Alex Squires, Shell Canada Limited; Dr. W. Gordon Squires; Robert Smith, president Marksall Industries Limited; and Robert Firth, general manager, North York Tennis Association Winter Club.

Vinyl-rubber
The dome-shaped bubble would be of vinyl-rubber composition and would have the capacity to resist children clamoring on the outside,

high winds, hail and missiles.

It would remain inflated by a large circulating fan built into the floor off to one side which would also provide heating to the structure.

Heating plant
A heating plant would be located outside and be enclosed by a 6 foot chain link fence in an area of 10 feet x 10 feet. Heating would be by gas or oil with a temperature of 20 degrees celsius maintained in the court area.

The bubble would have a life expectancy of 10 years but cost of replacing it would be minimal since the plant and lighting has a life expectancy of 20 years.

The bubble can be deflated and folded up in one day which would reduce a loss of court time to an absolute minimum.

Open membership
Membership would be

open to anyone in the Richmond Hill area who would like to play indoor tennis. During the summer months the bubble would be removed and the courts would revert back to community operated courts and the Richmond Hill Tennis Club.

The proposal brought a favorable reply from the recreation committee's staff.

It would provide year-round use of a seasonal facility at a reasonable cost to the user; enhance the value of the tennis facilities; no costs involved to the Town; eliminate the need for the town to provide such facilities even if funds were available.

Defer
The committee agreed to defer the proposal for further discussions with the principals including the Richmond Hill Tennis Club.
