

Housing action snags

MAPLE — Lawyers for the region and town of Vaughan are still arguing over the wording of the agreement for Ontario Housing Action Program housing in Pine Valley

Village near Woodbridge. Vaughan council adjourned a special council meeting from Monday until this afternoon in the hopes it can still get the agreement authorized

and receive about \$80,000 in grants by the March 31 deadline. Mayor Garnet Williams said, "We have changed the agreement three times and the region has changed it three times to try to overcome what we are doing."

Bob Holmes, the OHAP co-ordinator, was afraid the provincial cabinet would not approve the wording advocated by the region.

The region wants to make it perfectly clear this should include all the capital costs and the area which is to have a final population of 21,000 should not figure in calculations for sewer surcharges to the region.

Jr. kindergarten door is still open

AURORA — The door is still open for junior kindergartens in York Region.

Monday night, the York County board of education approved a recommendation by Trustee Bob McMonagle of Markham, calling for staff to prepare a report of various types of junior kindergarten programs.

McMonagle said the report "would look primarily into educational values and operating costs and exclude at this time, space availability and specific local needs."

The board was first approached to implement a junior kindergarten program in the area by a group of Thornhill parents in January.

The report is scheduled for the second board meeting in April.

Fire permits hard to get

LAKE WILCOX — Area residents wishing to burn off tall grass will find it increasingly difficult to obtain fire permits, it was revealed at an information meeting here Monday night.

Mayor Dave Schiller advised residents to contact the area fire chief, but warned "the ministry is getting stricter and stricter" with its concern about air pollution.

"But the town has a weed inspector," said Schiller.

"We can send in town crews to cut excessively long grass, and bill the property owner."

"This is a very hazy area of the law," he concluded. "Don't be too optimistic about the fire department."
