Admission for the afternoon show, which includes coffee, tea, pastries and dancing, is \$5 per person.

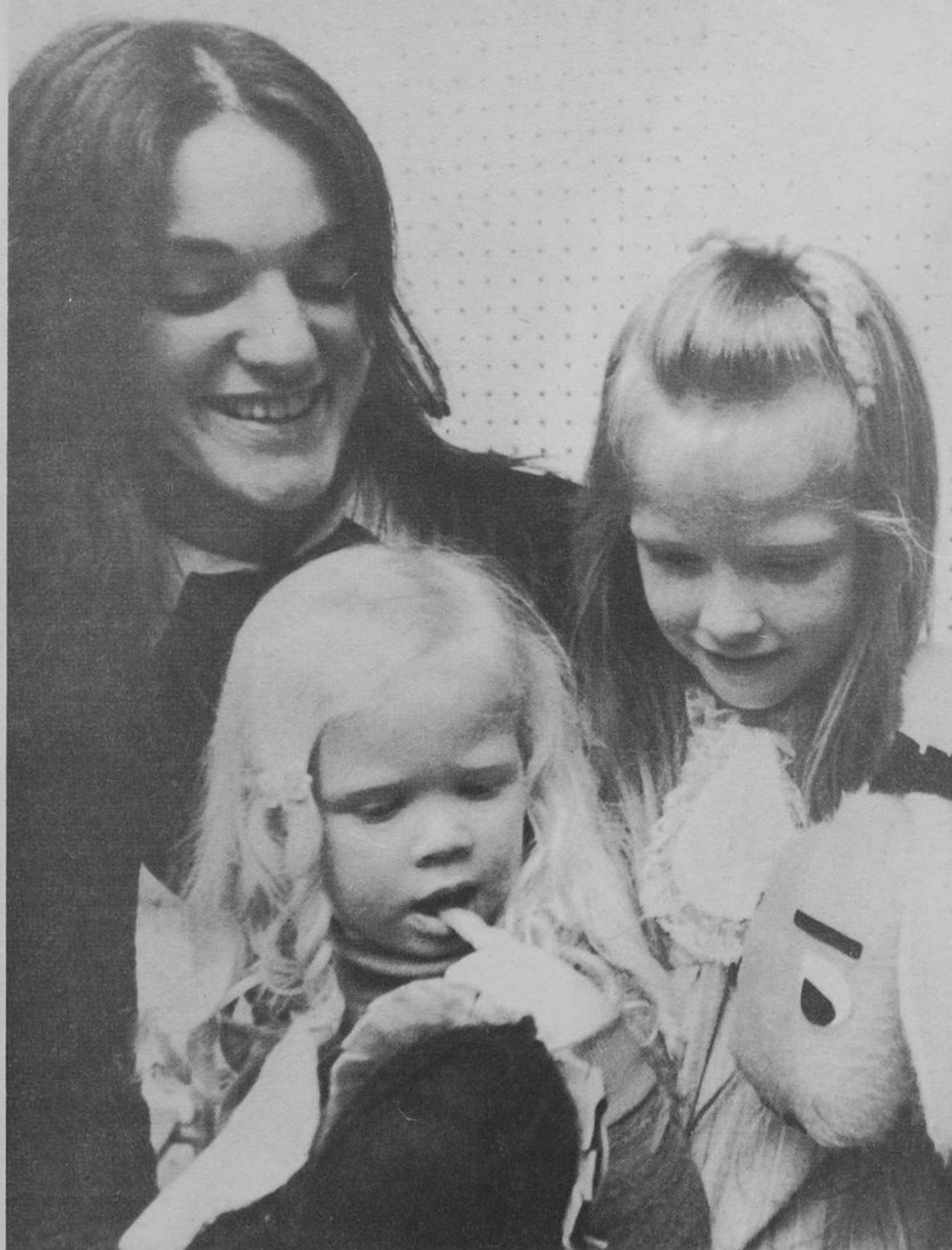
