They may pay

AURORA — Summer school students may eventually have to pay something for the privilege, if York County board of education has anything to do about it. Recently the board approved a motion by Trustee Margaret Coburn of King, calling for it to approach the minister of education regarding a change in legislation, to enable school boards in Ontario to charge a registration fee for the summer programs.

Mrs. Coburn said the object would be to recover some or all of the costs charged to local ratepayers.

Speaking against the motion, Donald Cousens of Markham said it was part of the philosophy to give free education in Ontario.

He said he wouldn't want to see costs preventing students from attending the courses.

Seconding Mrs. Coburn's motion was Bob McMonagle of Markham.

Shakespeare gets shaft

AURORA — The works of William Shakespeare, long a staple of Ontario high school reading, may have to have a special policy set for them to remain in the schools.

According to a delegation of teachers who attended a program committee of the board last week, the board's present policy could rule out such works as Macbeth, Romeo and Juliet, Richard the Third, Othello and The Merchant of Venice, parts of which could be considered obscene or racist, and contain explicit sex scenes.

All these things are taboo under board policy.

The board was to consider a recommendation from the program committee Tuesday night to rescind the policy and draft a new one.

Advances ignored

THORNHILL — The ministry of the environment is "pretending it doesn't know about advances made in sewage treatment," a University of Toronto professor told a group opposing the York-Durham sewer.

Great strides have been made since the 72-mile sewer was first proposed, Dr. Philip Jones, professor of environmental studies, said at a meeting of the Save the Rouge Valley System.

Most other countries in the world recognize the changes that have been made, Jones said.

"Ministry engineers go to the same conferences that I do."

He urged the group to try to persuade municipalities to press the province to scrap the new sewer system.
