The sport of horseshoes was taken up by Mary Archer quite by accident. She has always been a softball player of some note.

When playing out of Sunnyside Stadium and Coxwell Stadium (Monarch Park) and representing Canada at the World Tournament, she was selected All-American a number of times.

She also coached many teams at Fairbank Park. In fact, in early 1975 after surgery, Mary decided she wouldn't coach softball anymore but instead would take up tennis.

Before she even went out to play tennis, however, a friend invited her to the horseshoe pits at Glen Watford Park in Agincourt. Everyone young and old were

laughing and having a good time, so she decided to join.

At the end of the summer Mary ended up with the highest ringer percentage in the club. During the winter, she partnered Gloria Vandenburg and won the winter circuit horseshoe tournaments.

In 1976, her winning streak continued, and she won most of her tournaments and decided to enter the World Horseshoe Tournament held in Pennsylvania in August in which she ended up seventh.

She entered and won the Ontario Ladies Championship at the Canadian National
