Richmond Hill council Monday night defended its decision to examine all school board budget

This in response to a letter from a Newmarket resident, Robert Martin.

Mr. Martin wrote he was dismayed to learn of council's meddling decision in requesting both York Region school boards submit line item budgets to the municipality for examination and possible submission to the electorate.

"I'm that electorate, at least a small part of it," he wrote.

"And I'm perfectly capable of telephoning my three local public school trustees if I'm not happy about the way they are spending my tax dollars." "Despite this, it is definitely not your role to

strongarm an elected body that operates parallel to yours." "A council that's perfect can assist other elected bodies in achieving perfection," concluded Mr.

Martin. "From the minutes they submitted," countered Councillor Andy Chateauvert, "it looks like they're

playing games of in and out." "Members seem to be moving in and out in order to avoid voting on some of the issues . . . or maybe they're just tired," he said.

"When they do present it to us, it's a bumble." Chateauvert reminded listeners it used to be common practice for school boards to present budgets to council.


