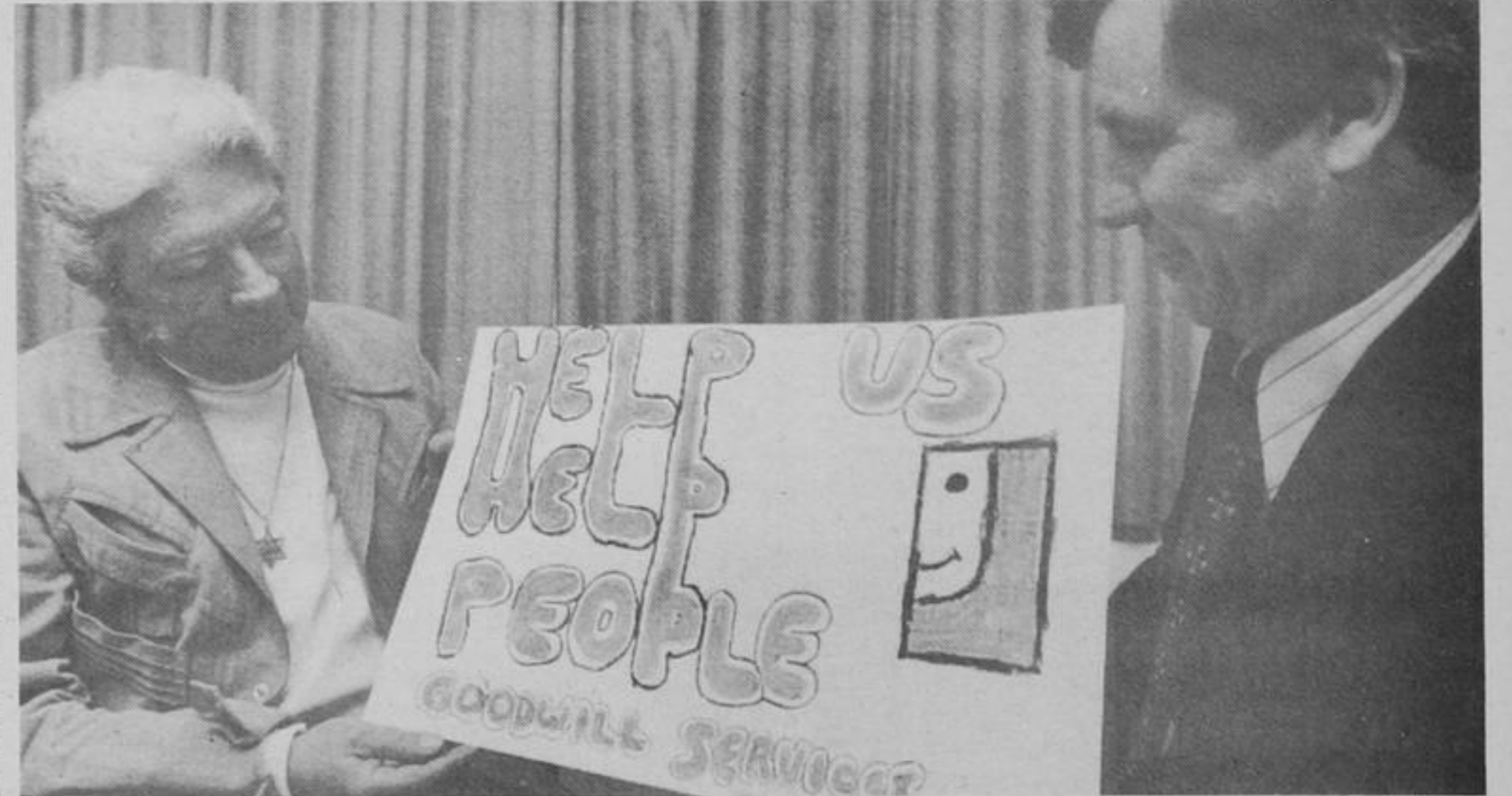


# Epileptic plans book

"It's all in your head," says Louise Robertson of Fonthill, speaking about epilepsy. That's why she has that as a working title for her book, *It's All in Your Head*. Miss Robertson, a former resident of Richmond Hill and former correspondent for The Liberal, is a victim of a form of temporal epilepsy. Because it is liable to manifest itself at any time, this illness prevents her from taking a permanent job. Because of that, and also because she feels she can help people recognize the disease and deal with it, she is writing the book. Miss Robertson, who last year had an operation to remove a cyst "the size of an egg" from her brain, said it was a relief to have the cyst discovered "after being told it was all in my head, neurotically speaking, for 14 years." She is interested in

hearing from other people who have had "similar hassles," as she would like to incorporate their stories in her book. "The core of my book deals with epilepsy, especially adult epilepsy," said Miss Robertson. She has already completed about 100 pages of the hoped for 400 and has a Toronto publisher interested in it. The "focus" would be on temporal lobe epilepsy; letters from people describing their experiences with it, would be reprinted in the book, using only the initials of the writers at the end. ## Barrie body wasn't Cheryl Hanson's

The body of a child found recently in Springwater Park near Barrie, has been identified as that of Jason John Rallo, 6, of Hamilton. When first discovered, there was some feeling it might have been that of Cheryl Hanson. She disappeared from her Bloomington Rd. home, May 31, 1974, while en route to her cousin's home, just 10 minutes away. Cheryl was seven at the time. York Regional Police viewed the remains of the

Barrie corpse several days after they were first discovered, and ruled out the possibility of them being the Hanson girl's, Jon Rallo, 33, father of the young boy, has been charged with second-degree murder in connection with the disappearance. Last August, he was charged with three counts of murder, the other two involving his wife, Sandra, 29, and daughter Stephanie, 5. Their bodies were discovered later in the St. Catharines area. Rallo is to be charged in the fall.

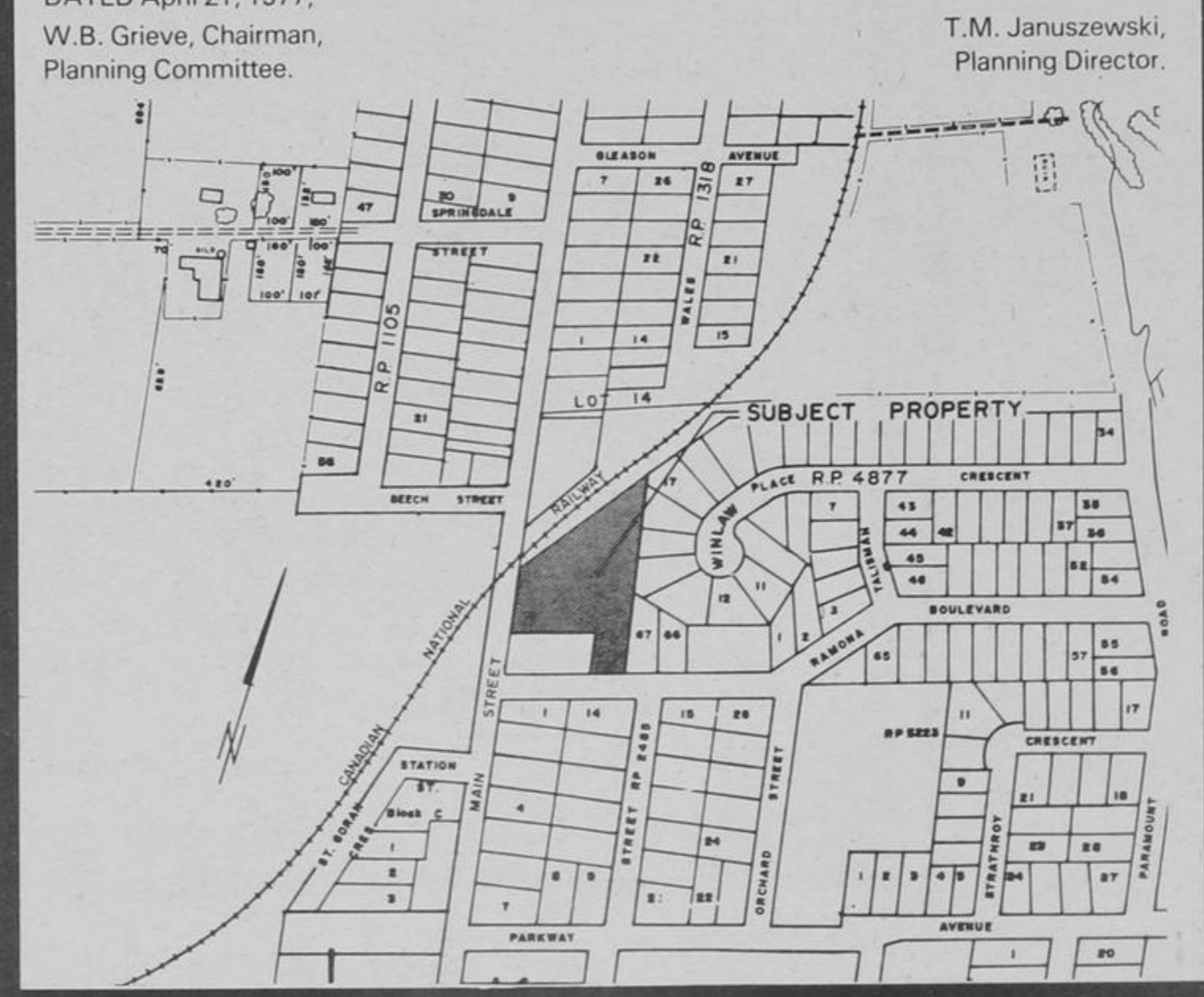

## Thornhill murder unsolved

John Ferguson, 34, of Toronto, who was being held in the murder of 16-year-old Tracy Kundering of Thornhill, has been released following a preliminary hearing. Miss Kundering's body was found Aug. 21, 1975 in a field near Thornhill. She had been strangled. The case against Ferguson revolved around his knowledge of two details of the case, supposedly known only to the police. However, a witness was produced who, when told, had been given the details by police, and subsequently discussed them with the accused. After his release, Ferguson committed himself to the Mental Health Centre on Queen St. in Toronto.
