



### Thornhill murder unsolved

John Ferguson, 34, of Toronto, who was being held in the murder of 16year-old Tracy Kundinger of Thornhill, has been released following a preliminary hearing.

Miss Kundinger's body was found Aug. 21, 1975 in a field near Thornhill. She had been strangled.

The case against Ferguson revolved around his knowledge of two details of the case, supposedly known only to the police. However, a witness was

produced who, court was told, had been given the details by police, and subsequently discussed them with the accused. After his release,

Ferguson committed himself to the Mental Health Centre on Queen St. in Toronto.
