Andrew Boszin paints real

"All art comes from the life experience of the artist".

Painter sculptor Andrew Boszin has had a wealth of experience, some water color fruits of which he will be displaying this month in the Gordon MacLaren Auditorium of the Richmond Hill Public Library.

Interviewed in his Richmond Hill studio last week, Boszin spoke of his artistic beginnings in Hungary, his flight from the communists, and the gradual recognition awarded his work, which evolved as he himself grew.

Unlike most art students, Boszin started with cubism — the favorite of his first teacher. From there came an other-worldly realism which gradually became pure impressionism and ultimately complete abstraction.

"My problem with teachers," he recalls, "is that they always wanted me to draw things as they are." filled with struggle and hardship, and, like most artists, you know he wouldn't have had it any other way.

"You know," he said, "God is very often not a man with a beard, but the universe."

"Art (and music and literature) is part of the creation process," he explains.

"Art creators are almost gods in a way."

"You work so that you're not alone."

As to the 'art' in 'modern art', Boszin is philosophical.

"What makes an artist is the knowledge of when to stop."

"What makes a painting art is accidental."

As Boszin explains it, the primary duty of an artist is to follow the initial impulse to create... letting the work take its own shape from then on. The result is often something which only another artist can appreciate.

"Artists always want to explore further, to come closer to perfection."

"And, when you are happy with something, you want to see if you can do it again and again!" he laughs.

Retreat proves fruitful

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If you operate a business or farm and create a new position for the summer, the Ontario Youth Employment Program will give you a grant of \$1 per hour toward the wages of an unemployed youth you hire for the job.

As a matter of fact, grants are available for up to six new positions per business or farm for each operational site, and you may hire any unemployed youth between the ages of 15 and 24 who lives in Ontario and is eligible to work here.

The program will be in effect from May 30th to September 16th, 1977, but the full 16 week commitment is not required.
