Ask and ye shall receive

Fifty days after Easter Day, Sunday May 29th, is the Feast of Pentecost, commonly called Whitsunday. On this day the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples and filled them with power and love; sending them forth into the world to preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ.
But who is the Holy Spirit? Of course, most know him to be the third person of the Holy Trinity. But they don't know much more, despite the talk and activity surrounding Charismatic Renewal throughout churches in this day.
It is impossible to do justice to this question within my limitations of approximately 400 words, but let's at least make a start:
Whenever God is specially active, the Bible speaks about the 'Spirit'. In the Old Testament,

the Spirit of God is said to have been over the waters which chaotically covered the earth. Out of these waters came life, as modern science agrees.
There are other such references of the Spirit in nature, but more frequently the Spirit works through lives of men and women. He is said to have inspired the early heroes of Israel who were clever and energetic (the judges), the men and women who are Israel's bravest and best guides (the Prophets), Israel's wisest rulers (the Kings) and the skilled craftsmen who made beautiful furnishings and robes for the temple in Jerusalem.
But in the New Testament, a surprising new way of the Spirit's activity is reported, which is why Christians give the Spirit a new honour.
What is novel is that

now the most ordinary people—leading commonplace lives—are invaded, shaken and possessed by the Spirit. And all of this because of the New Man, Jesus.
Jesus, so full of the Spirit, promised the Father would give the Spirit to those who asked.
In Jerusalem, when for the first time after the resurrection and ascension the apostles were celebrating the Jewish harvest-festival called Pentecost, this promise came true.
The small company of Christians felt themselves filled with a new power. In their excitement they broke out in strange tongues and cries. They excited those around them, who then listened to the first Christian sermon.
And this new power did not leave. It gave them courage to defy the authorities. It gave them eloquence to announce their message and to argue for its truth.
The power of the Spirit takes the Christian faith into the whole world.
That same power has been experienced by Christians in every generation since those

fort. But that is not the Christian experience.
The reason that these virtues are called a harvest is that each comes from a seed. That seed is God's love for us.
When people realize the Christian message is indeed Good News; that the Spirit has this splendid reality in the lives of so many, they often want to know how they too, can receive the gift of the Spirit.
To that, there is only one possible answer. You must ask for it. The Bible is absolutely clear about this, and so is Christian experience.
Everyone who asks receives.

**THE COMMISSION ON
Freedom of
Information and
Individual Privacy**

The Commission on Freedom of Information and Individual Privacy by authority vested in it by the Government of Ontario will undertake an enquiry to examine:

1. Public information practices of other jurisdictions in order to consider possible changes which are compatible with the parliamentary traditions of the Government of Ontario and complementary to the mechanisms that presently exist for the protection of the rights of individuals;
2. The individual's right of access and appeal in relation to the use of Government information;
3. The categories of Government information which should be treated as confidential in order to protect the public interest;
4. The effectiveness of present procedures for the dissemination of Government information to the public;
5. The protection of individual privacy and the right of recourse in regard to the use of Government records.

One aspect of the Study will include the acceptance of written Briefs and the Receipt of Submissions as well as a series of public meetings throughout the Province.

Persons or groups wishing to make representations to the Commission on any aspect of the Study are requested to write to the Counsel, Commission of Freedom of Information and Individual Privacy, 444 Waterloo Street, London, Ontario N6B 2P3 or to submit written Briefs with the undersigned not later than August 1, 1977.

Public hearings will be held at times and places in Ontario to be announced later and those filing Briefs or letters who wish to appear personally will be advised as to the time and place when they will be heard.

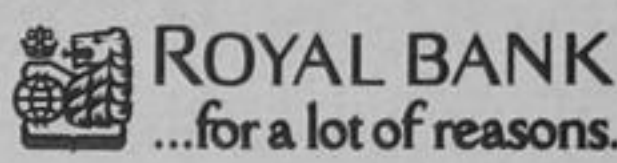

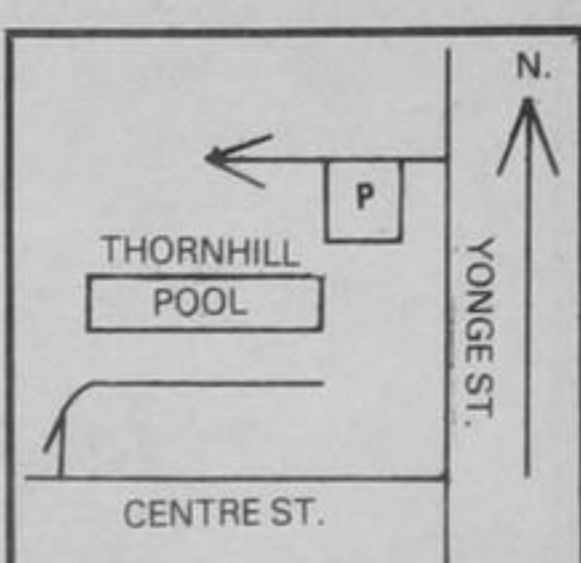
