

# Freedom of Information and Individual Privacy

THE COMMISSION ON

The Commission on Freedom of Information and Individual Privacy by authority vested in it by the Government of Ontario will undertake an enquiry to examine:

- Public information practices of other jurisdictions in order to consider possible changes which are compatible with the parliamentary traditions of the Government of Ontario and complementary to the mechanisms that presently exist for the protection of the rights of individuals;
- 2. The individual's right of access and appeal in relation to the use of Government information;
- The categories of Government information which should be treated as confidential in order to protect the public interest;
- The effectiveness of present procedures for the dissemination of Government information to the public;

The protection of individual privacy and the right of recourse in regard to the use of Government records.


