## Vaughan developer \$147,500 deferment

Vaughan Town is allowing up to \$147,500 in lot levy payments on a Milani subdivision to be deferred until building permits are issued. The town normally requires a \$3,000 payment per lot at the time of registration.

The subdivision involved, Millview, is 99 estate sized lots northwest of Bathurst Street and Elgin Mills Road. Town Engineer Dick Kraft told council he was surprised when it happened. "(Cam) Milani asked for it right here," he said, pointing to the podium in the council chamber.

Some councillors appeared surprised too as they did not remember the request. "When did that happen?" Councillor

Dave Fraser said. The argument, said Kraft, was that some of the homes in the subdivision would not be built for many years. "Now that it is out in the open everyone is going to be coming in here asking for the same thing."

Milani is currently negotiating with a committee of councillors for another, large estate residential subdivision in Kleinburg in accordance with an Ontario Municipal Board decision last year.

Kraft said the town had not had a subdivision agreement allowing 50 per cent of the lot levy fees at the building permit stage since the "very first stage of West Woodbridge."

Milani also got a \$11,600 rebate on a water main on Woodbridge Avenue, he said. It was the difference between what he needed for his own development and what was needed in the future by others, said Kraft.

He added that Milani was getting about \$69,000 back from the province for the watermain being built up Bathurst Street to the Millview subdivision. The one-sixth grant was available through the Ontario Housing Action Program because it was opening up new land.

Milani did not want to build the main in the first place because he had adequate water on his property. York Region insisted on it.

Vaughan called tenders on the two-mile main and a pumping station because it could only qualify for a federal Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation loan as a public project.

Councillor Jim Cameron had been critical of the loan as CMHC was supposed to be helping to provide lower cost housing.

Kraft estimated that the houses in Millview would cost \$250,000 each.

### Student is one on nation's best

Vernon Stringer of Bayview secondary school, has placed second in the Life Science category of the Canada-Wide Science Fair at Victoria, it was announced this week.

Stringer, a Grade 12 student, received a silver medal for his winning project, "Comparative sensitivity of normal and malignant cells to diphtheria toxin."

He also won an award and \$50 from the Canadian federation of biological societies for the best project in experimental biology.

In addition, he received \$100 and the Perry memorial award from the Canadian society for immunology.

It was his fourth trip to the Fair. Peter Smereka, York County's second representative at the fair, received \$100 from the Canadian association of physicists, and \$50 from the electrostatic society of America for his project, "An electrostatic accelerator."

Smereka is a Grade 12 student at Aurora high school.

### 4 drug smuggling arrests

Three people were arrested at Toronto International Airport last week on their arrival from Jamaica, in connection with an attempt to smuggle \$60,000 worth of narcotics into the country, say York Regional Police.

A fourth person was arrested the same day on Highway 11 in Bradford, and found to have a quantity of cannabis resin on him, police said.

In the arrest at the airport, eight pounds of hashish oil was found on the person of one of the suspects.

Charged with conspiracy to import narcotics, plus possession of cannabis resin, were Russell Dollin, 25, of Queen's Court, Newmarket; John Appelman, 20, Danforth Ave., Toronto; Lillian Bertelsen, 27, of 31 Yonge St., Aurora; Peter Osti, 25, of Edge Hill Dr., Barrie.
