It used to be a lot worse! Come to Black Creek Pioneer Village throughout the month of June between 2 and 4 p.m.

You'll see demonstrations of flour milling, log squaring, shingle making, spinning, weaving and sheep shearing (weather permitting).

A cross section of artisan and commercial establishments can be seen at Black Creek, representative of a rural settlement prior to 1867. Visitors can watch such craftsmen as gunsmiths, printers and millers working at their trades, using tools and skills almost forgotten. There's even a general store, complete with an old time candy counter.

The Village, located at Jane Street and Steeles Avenue, is open 7 days a week. Admission is \$2.50 for adults, 75 cents for students, \$1.50 for senior citizens and \$5 for families.

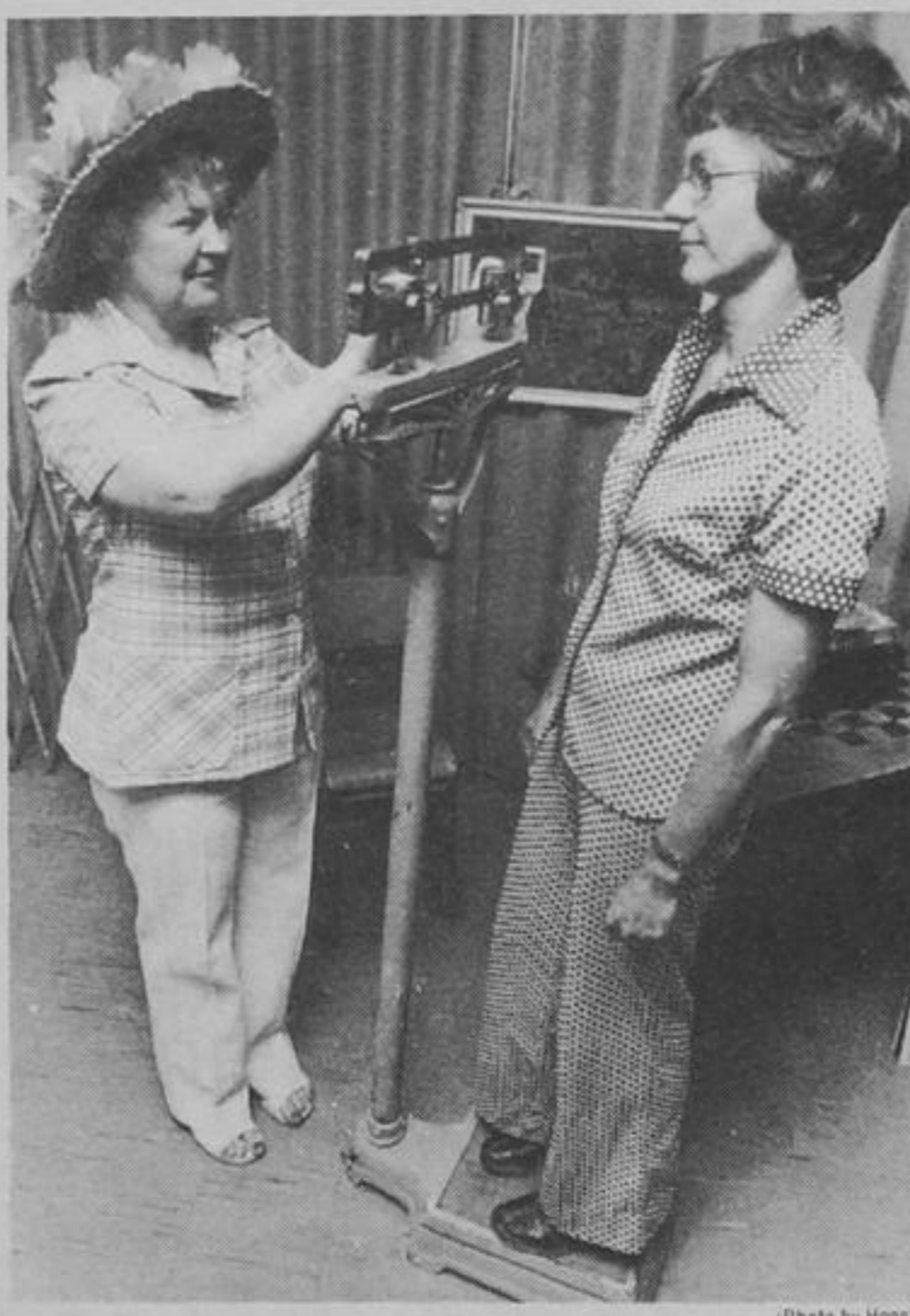

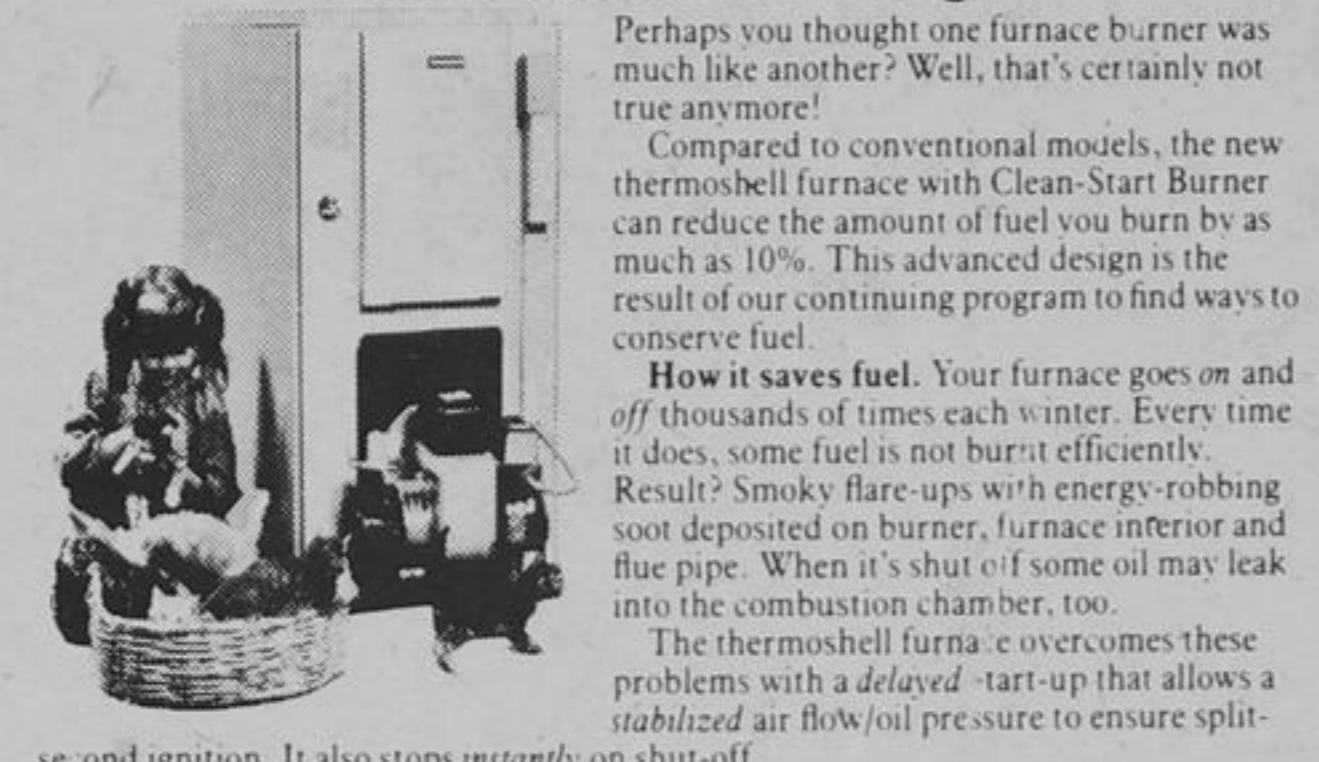

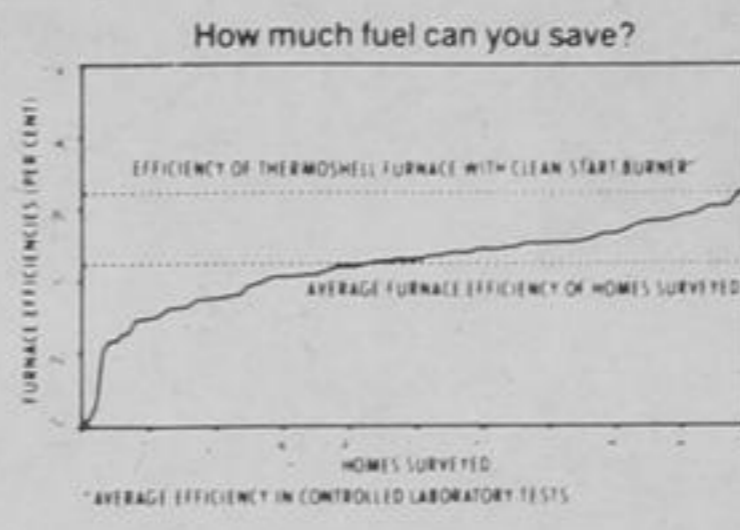
