Arts and crafts will be displayed. Refreshments will be available.

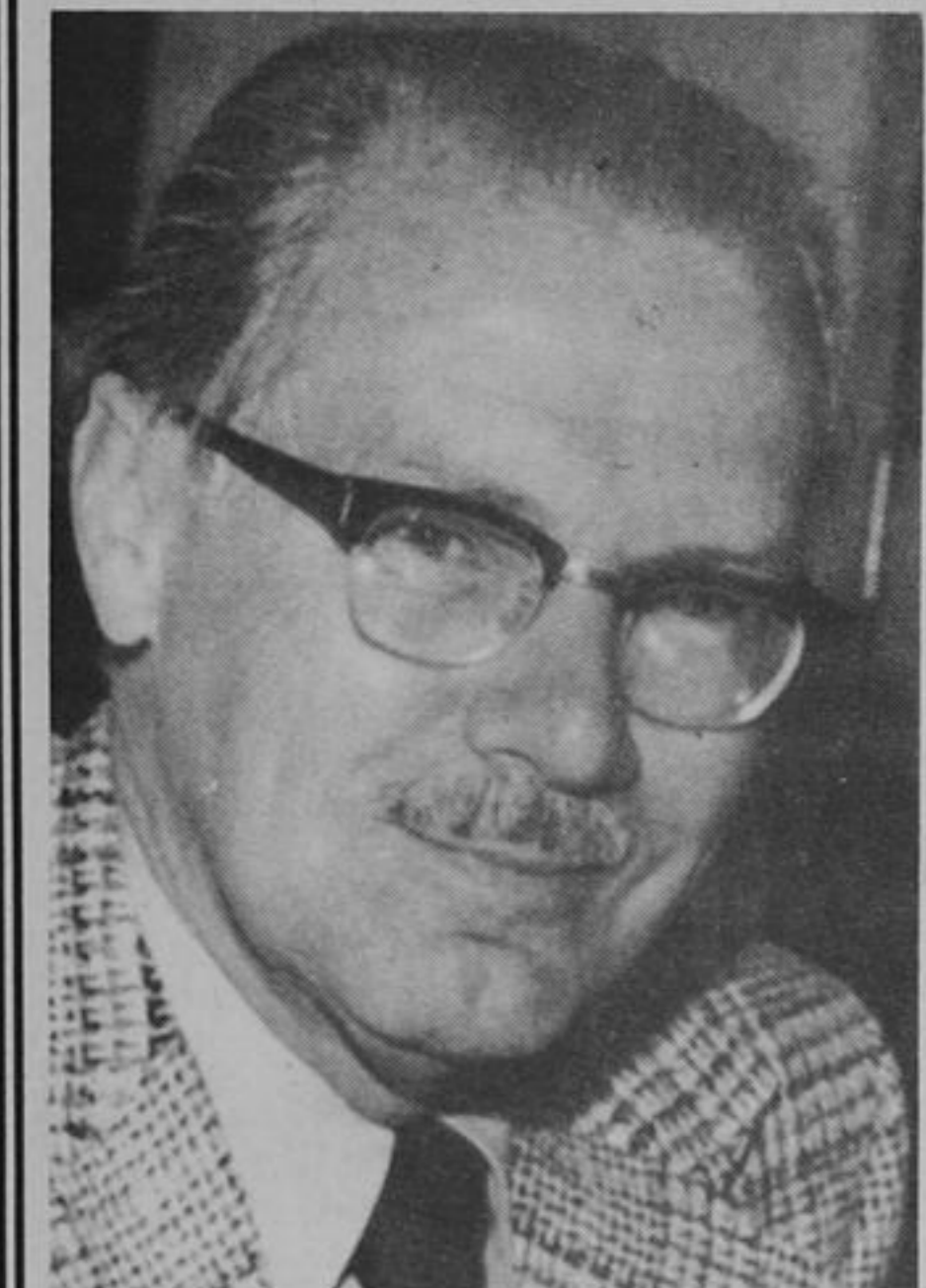

For Peter Etherington and Rob Butler, this coincidence means a timely and growing business.

For the past two and a half months they have been managing a new company — Fibre-Therm — and according to Peter, "we're pleased with the results so far."

The Centre Street plant takes in almost 50 tons of newsprint a week — delivered from recycling depots, Metro Toronto, and the Liberal's own driver.

"The Liberal's best ... it's brand new newsprint," says Peter.

The paper is sucked into a large vacuum and shredded to a grey pulplike substance with the consistency of brown sugar.

As it's shredded, chemicals are added; borax, aluminum sulphate and boric acid. This makes it highly fire

resistant and quite unpalatable to rodents.

From there it's blown into 30 lb bags and sent to the company's distributors; Bowden and Oriole Lumber in this area, and by rail as far east as Newfoundland.

Although insulation-from-newsprint has been established for almost forty years in the United States, Fibre-Therm is one of only four such companies in Ontario.

"We're looking to consolidate the Ontario market," says Peter, who expects business to really start booming this fall.

The company now employs 15 workers and is dealing with the Richmond Hill Manpower office to hire students for the summer.

POLLS open at 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. (local times) on Election Day, June 9th

If your name is on the New list of voters, you are eligible to vote in this Ontario Provincial Election. To make it as convenient as possible, the polling places in each district are centrally located in your area. An attempt has also been made to make polling places as accessible as possible for physically handicapped and elderly voters. Check your proof of enumeration, Form 103, for the address of your polling place.

On the wall of each polling place, directions for marking your ballot will be in plain view. If you have any other questions, ask the person who gives you your ballot. Vote by marking only the circle after the candidate's name of your choice.
