June 6 saw the Hillers come up with a dismal performance and were defeated 8-7 by Eringate. Although Eringate had

only three hits, they took full advantage of wild throws to score their runs.

Form new track club

Some of the more outstanding track and field athletes in the Richmond Hill area will be getting specialized treatment this summer.

The treatment will come by way of the newly-formed Tri-Town Track Club under the leadership of Bob Thompson of Richmond Hill.

Thompson, a former coach with the Richmond Hill Athletic Club, has organized the club to assist "some of our top young athletes in preparing for upcoming elimination meets."

The elimination meets will decide which athletes will compete in the two major championships being held next August.

Summer games
They are the Canada Summer Games in Newfoundland for junior athletes (ages 16 to 19 years) and the National championships in New Brunswick during the week of Aug. 20.

The Canadian Legion will also hold a training camp at the same time for the younger Bantam-Midget competitors (12 to 15 years). The expenses-paid competitions last a week.

Coaching staff
A four man coaching staff will offer a complete range of expertise for Tri-Town with coach Thompson assisting in the throwing events and pentathlon. Fred Phinio, of Richmond Hill, will handle the sprints and jumping disciplines.

Fred Robbins of Oak Ridges will work with all runners participating in the 800 metres and up categories as well as oversee the road racing and cross country teams.

Masters' Section
Another facet of the Tri-Town operation will see the formation of a Master's Section (over 35) with Joe Watson of Oak Ridges as contact person.

Rounding out the organization is Jean Thompson, secretary and Patti Robbins, of Richmond Hill, the publicity and information officer.

Thompson told "The Liberal" that "each coaching section is designed to accommodate 6 to 10 athletes to insure the individual coaching communication is maintained between coach and athlete."

An impressive list of

area athletes has been prepared as initial team members with many of them having just finished competing in the provincial high school finals in Sudbury.

are OFSAA finalists Graham MacDonald, Sue French, Marianne Ball, Suzanne Manning, Jane Toporowski and Dennis Lamoges.

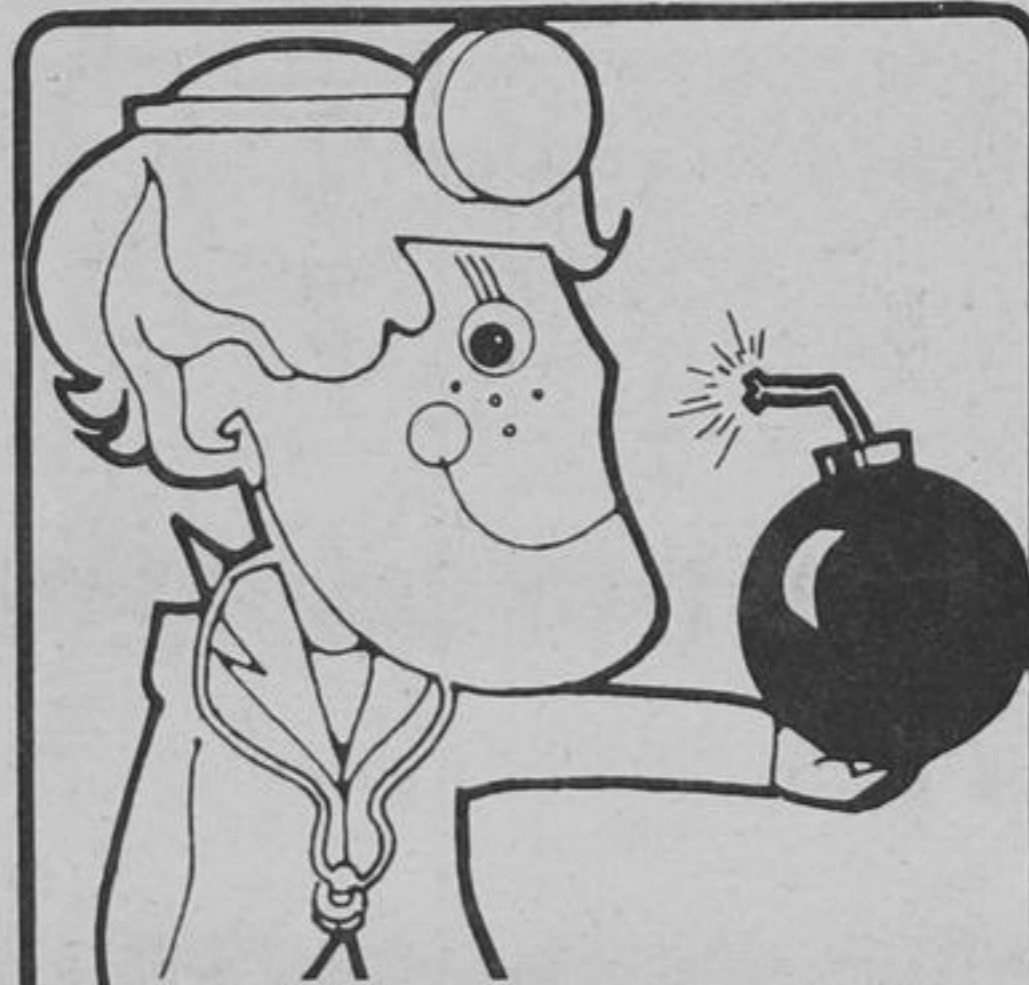
Other top flight local athletes who will be training regularly over the next six weeks are Bill French, Danny Henderson, Heinz Losberg
