

Dynes dump Beaches 4-1

The rains came, but too late to help Beaches A.C., as they lost 4-1 to Richmond Hill Dynes in a slightly-abbreviated contest last Thursday in a Beaches Fastball league game at the Town Park.

The game, which was scheduled for seven innings, ended in the bottom of the seventh although Beaches had only two men out.

As that team attempted to bring a run in from third, the heavens opened and the game was called.

It was the second win in two nights for Dynes, who tripped up Harper Diesel 3-1 at the Beaches, Wednesday, Doug Webster besting John Lenneville.

Webster struck out 12 men to 11 for Lenneville and gave up six hits, one fewer than his opponent.

He allowed one walk, compared with two for the loser.

Webster's mates were also a little surer afield, committing just one error, while Harper came up with four.

Real Estate hammered Town Auto Body 13-3. The winners had nine runs piled up after only two innings.

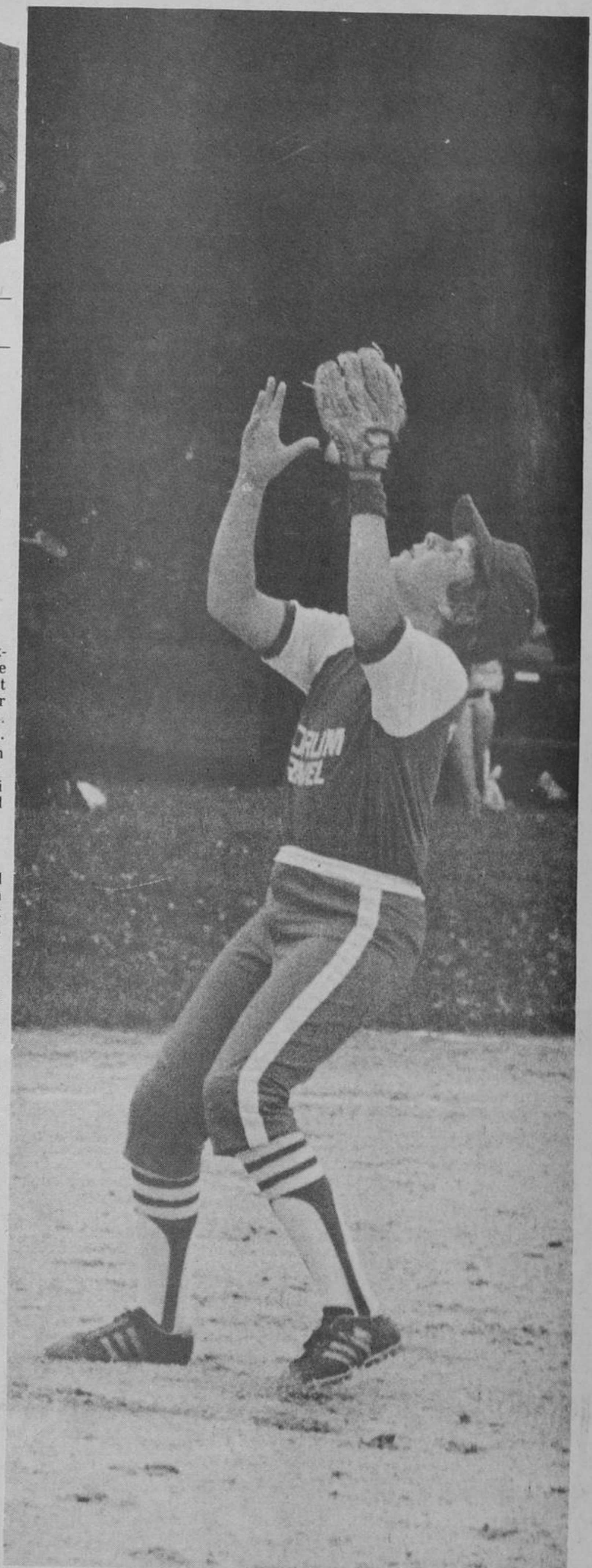

Doesn't that look great? Since I have been with The Liberal a mere month, it's difficult to speak with any intelligence on any subjects, but it never stopped me in the past, so why now, I wonder.

Friday afternoon, right in the heart of downtown Richmond Hill, I took a walk in the forest.

With Recreation Superintendent Lynton Friedberg acting as guide, I was led through a heavy forested area to the north of the Mill Pond and had anyone told me I was surrounded by 35,000 people, I would have sent them back to a bar.

The area is all part of the Mill Pond complex, but this district is not heavily travelled at all, Lynton said.

And that doesn't make sense to me, unless people simply don't know it's there. The walking trail from Rumble Avenue north and west through the bush, parallels, at spots, the Richmond Hill Golf Club. It rises about 40 vertical feet, through lush greenery, brilliant wild flowers, and hundreds of noisy birds.

The trail opens onto a large picnic area, known as the Polish Park (who knows why it's called that?) which is highlighted by a covered cement area which was built by the Rotary Club in 1969.

I'm so full of information, it's startling.

People wishing to hold picnics there can have all the tables they need, if they call Lynton.

Anyhow, if you yearn to take a walk in the forest, you don't have to head for Bracebridge. There's one right around your corner.

Parks and Recreation Committee met in the council chambers Thursday night, and I was introduced to a few of the recreational events and problems in the community.

People in Oak Ridges should know that, even though the inside of Bond Lake Arena has been torn apart for renovations, there still won't be roller skating in your end of town.

Continue going to Aurora or King City, skaters, because it won't happen in Oak Ridges... at least not this summer.

A proposed children's fishing dock, which, if approved, will be built at the Mill Pond, has been deferred until September.

Little was said about that item Thursday, but I get the impression a lot of people are not in favor of the dock.

I assume parents are worried their offsprings could and would topple from the structure.

The dock would be 24 feet long with a "T" at the end and railings on all sides.

Quote worth remembering: From Parks and Recreation Director David Hamilton came these words — "Our policy is to listen to people when we want to make a major change."

Wonder how we could get the Regional Municipality of York to adopt a similar slogan?
