Richmond Hill man appearing at Inn

Singer-songwriter Jeff Moore has lived in Richmond Hill for all his 19 years and is appearing this week at the Richmond Inn for his first engagement there.
He wants to make music his career and believes that you can do anything if you really put your heart into it.
He is recording a single called "Dear Julie," one of his own songs, which should be released sometime in the late fall.
"If the single takes off, I'll probably get a chance for a complete album," he said.
This will not be his first, however, since he recorded an album in December, 1974, called "The Youngest Son" on the Pickwick label, a subsidiary of Columbia records.
There were technical problems with the album and Jeff did not promote the product because he was not entirely happy with the outcome.
This experience turned him away from the music industry for a time.
But now, he is ready to get right back into the music world and has just returned from a western tour where he played in bars in northern Manitoba and Alberta and at the Winnipeg Folk Festival.
"I'm really looking forward to playing at the Inn. There is a hometown atmosphere there and I do not really worry about catering to a certain type of crowd. I'll be playing a couple of my own compositions in each set along with a lot of my MOR (middle-of-the-road) stuff," he said.

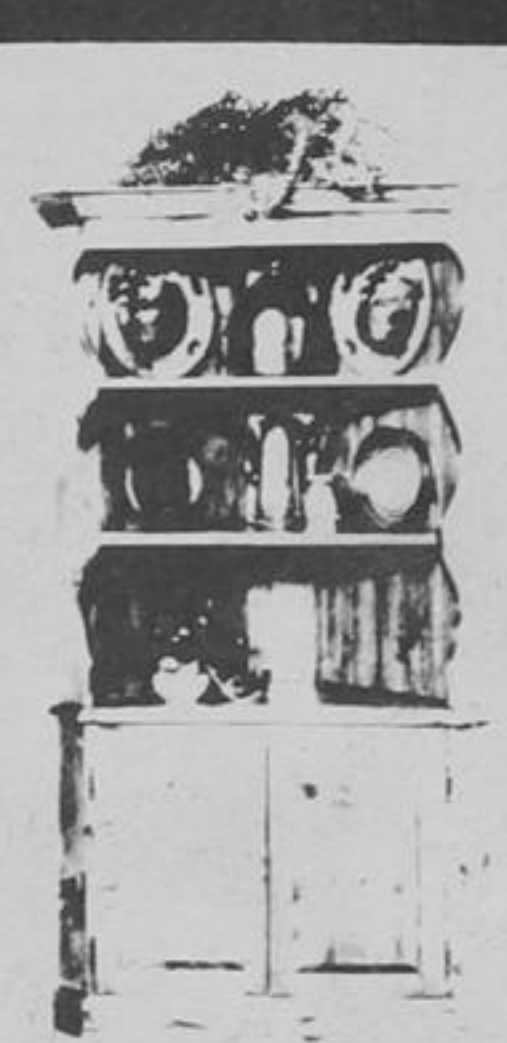
