



Markham proclaims United Way month in Oct.

Markham council carried a motion to approve the United Way campaign in York Region starting Sept. 26 at a council meeting last

"The United Way funds eight different agencies in the Markham area," said James McDonald, chairman of the government division. "The target this year is \$400,000 in York Region."

Citizenship applications available

Becoming a Canadian citizen for residents of Woodbridge, Thornhill, Richmond Hill and Markham has been something like pregnancy.

It has taken nine months to get through the red tape and two trips downtown to see examiners, says Gwen Patton of Information Markham.

Now the department of the secretary of state is using a mobile unit.

Citizenship applications are available from local community information centres.

These are the Help Information and Referral Centre, Woodbridge, 851-2333, Helpmate, Richmond Hill, 883-2234, and Information Markham, 297-3459.

Ms. Patton says that with the new service, when 40 applications are filled out, members of the mobile unit from the department of the secretary of state will come out for interviews of applicants at the information centre. This is when the documents are signed.

Next a judge comes out to swear in the new citizens. Finally in the third stage, the citizens are presented with their papers.

It is hoped that the program will cut the waiting time in half.

Help in Woodbridge already has 30 ap-plications and the necessary 40 are expected within a week.

Near death art lives in Thornhill
