

Posh wedding in King

A colorful ceremony and a reception for 300 guests marked the marriage Saturday of Gwendolyn Eve Britnell, the only daughter of King Mayor Margaret Britnell and the late Stanley Britnell, to James William Curran, son of Mr. and Mrs. William V. Curran, in All Saints Anglican Church, King City.

The ceremony was conducted in Church of England tradition, with heather and wild lavender flown from the banks of the Severn in England. Music was provided by the pipes of the 48th Highlanders of Canada and the boys' choir of St. James Cathedral.

The Rev. Canon Joseph de Pencier Wright officiated. Aubrey Foy, organist and choirmaster at St. James Cathedral, played the organ and directed the choir.

The bride was given in marriage by her mother. She wore a Nina Ricci gown of white wool and silk, with a short lace headdress, and carried a bouquet of roses with heather and wild lavender brought by her godmother, Mrs. Harold Wagstaff from Tewksbury, England. Mrs. Wagstaff is Mayor Britnell's sister.

The bridesmaids were Susan Smithyes and Lauren McKim.

The groomsmen were Ross Hare. Ushers were Peter Gould, Clayton Chapman, Robert Curran, John Stewart, Conrado Marin and James Britnell.

Following the recessional, the bride and groom were met by the pipes of the 48th Highlanders of Canada, regiment of the groom's father.

A wedding breakfast followed at King's Wood, the bride's home.

Included among the guests were Dr. Stuart Smith, leader of the Liberal Party of Ontario and his wife Paddy; York North MPP William Hodgson and Mrs. Hodgson; former King reeve and York County warden Gordon Cook and his wife; and a host of present and former York politicians.

Telegrams of good wishes came from John Roberts, Canada's Secretary of State and former York-Simcoe MP; Sidney C. Hopton and family of England, great uncle of the bride; and several other members of the family.

The newlyweds will honeymoon in Quebec before resuming their studies at York University. They will reside in the University Colony Apartments.

A Thornhill woman was seriously injured when she was run over by her own car in an unusual accident Sunday morning.
