The Jewellers are at home to Thornhill for a Monday night 7:30 game and go back to Thornhill the following Friday night.

"We're fairly set but we're still open for a couple more hockey players," said Artemchuk. "If the right player comes along we'll grab him."

Artemchuk's probable starting line-up against Thornhill will see the Steve Sherman, Dale Roffey, Cam Reston line assured of a year of togetherness.

The next line will probably see Mike Carnevale centring Brent Dobson and Tony Robins.

Still uncertain but a good likelihood will be a third line with wingers Shane Harvey and Dennis Limoges being centred by either Glen Wright or

Sullivan. Defence will include newcomers Doug Pollock, O'Dacre, Neil Crockford and Randy Irwin.

Veteran goalie Doug

Brumwell will undoubtedly start in net although Artemchuk is high on back-up goalie Dave Heisey who played with a Toronto juvenile club last season.

"Dave's only 16 and he's looked very good out there. He should surprise a few people this season."

The Jewellers close out

their exhibition schedule with a home game tomorrow night (Thursday) and then travel to Etobicoke for a weekend tilt.
