

Rossini to appear at Richmond Hill, Vaughan libraries

Rabbits peering out of hats, illusions that appear and disappear in the wink of an eye, doves that perform a variety of tricks and more magic will be coming to Richmond Hill and Vaughan Libraries over the next few weeks.

Rossini the Magician will perform his magic in a show at the three branches of the Richmond Hill Public Library Saturday, November 5.

He'll be at the Richvale Branch at noon; in the Main Branch at 1.30 p.m. and in the Charles Connor Memorial Branch at 3 p.m.

Rossini will be at the Concord Branch of the Vaughan Public Library, Saturday, October 15, at 2 p.m.

On Saturday, October 29, he will appear at Maple at 2 p.m., while people in Kleinburg will see the show Saturday, November 26 at 2 p.m.

The performances are sponsored by the libraries involved and the Central Ontario Regional Library System with grants from the Ministry of Culture and Recreation, and the Ontario Arts Council.

Admission is free. Rossini the Magician, who hails from Burlington, has designed a magic show that features active participation from the audience, and the performances in Richmond Hill and Vaughan promise to be no exception.

The show includes balloon moulding, a "fantasy" of doves, illusionettes, comedy magic, a magical rabbit and a great deal of fast patter and light-hearted entertainment.

Rossini has received many tributes for his former library performances.

Irma Salmon, librarian at Binbrook Public Library, said, "Rossini thrilled a large audience of children and adults."

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DESIGNATE

Take notice that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Markham on the 14th day of June, 1977, decided to designate the lands and buildings known municipally as 37 and 39 Colbourne Street, Thornhill, Ontario, as a property of architectural and historical value or interest under The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, S.O. Chapter 122.

SHORT STATEMENT OF THE REASONS FOR THE PROPOSED DESIGNATION:

The lands and buildings comprising 37 and 39 Colbourne Street in Thornhill, Ontario, are recommended for designation for architectural and historical reasons as good examples of a type of building prevalent to the area in the middle of the 19th century. The double or semi-detached house was a common sight in the early stages of Canadian domestic architecture, especially in milling villages such as Thornhill. This particular double house was owned by Thomas Hamill Robinson, a carpenter, and he most likely rented it to workers from Thornhill's mills located along the nearby Don river.

The property and dwellings are important in terms of the local streetscape as the easternmost units of a series of houses between Yonge Street and Church Lane. This area forms the best preserved and perhaps the most typical section of the old village of Thornhill.

Notice of Objection to the designation may be served on the Clerk within thirty days of the 5th day of October, 1977.

Thornhill was not only the scene of several heists last week, but some hefty ones as well.

Heaviest hit was United Media Studios, 121 Doncaster Ave., which lost a total of \$22,000 in recording and camera equipment, as the result of a break-in sometime during Sept. 27 and 28. At Hi-Way Collision Ltd., Highway 7 E., thieves made off with \$7,200 in mechanic's tools.

HOMES, TOO

Thornhill homes also had their share of visits from burglars, with jewelry making up much of the loot.

L. Lombardo, Chestwood Rd., reported the theft of \$3,800 in jewelry in a break-in.

Jerry Prchlik, Porterfield Cres., lost \$3,150 in jewelry, camera equipment, clothing and jewelry.

Police said he also reported the theft of some wall murals, but just how that was done wasn't explained.

A Julia St. resident, Harry Schilhab, was out a

camera and a necklace valued at \$1,800, while Joyce Deitcher, Spirea Cr., was relieved of \$270 in cash.

MARKHAM ARREST

Police arrested a man in a Markham business place, shortly after being summoned there by a burglar alarm.

Police checked Demetre Furs Ltd., Main St. N., about 8:40 p.m., Oct. 1, and found the premises secure.

However, just as they were about to leave, the sound of glass breaking, took them to another part of the building, where they found a man trying to break out.

He was carrying a revolver and had removed \$20,000 in furs, after chiselling through a wall in the building, police said.

A youth from the house objected and then brought out the gun and ordered the driver off the property, police said.

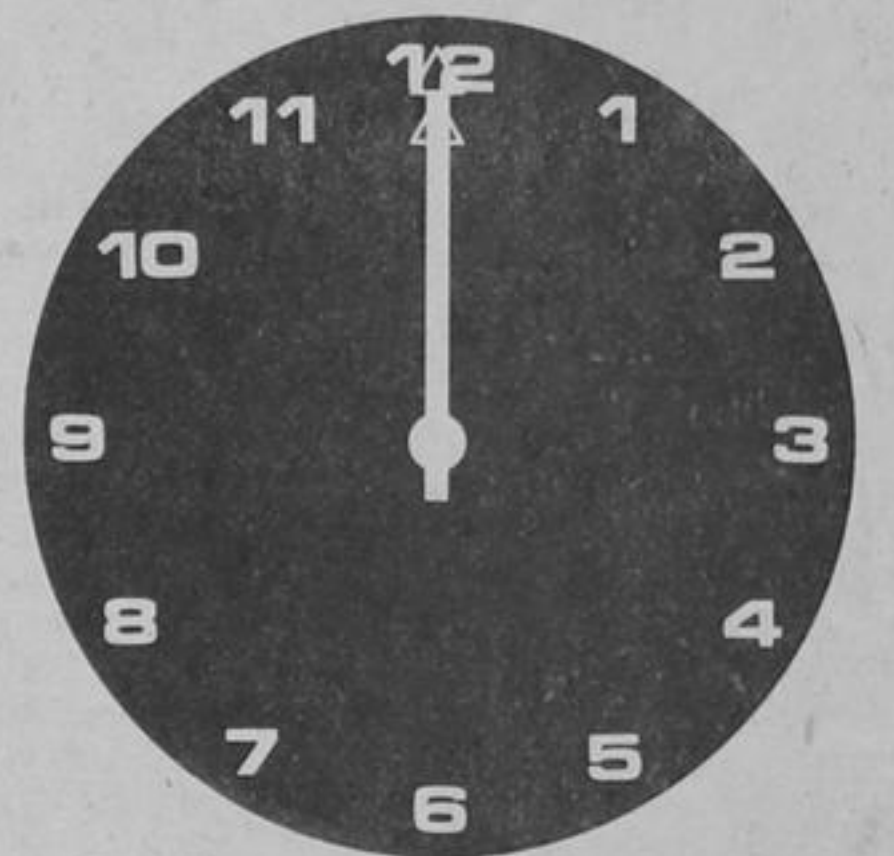
The gun was later found to be incapable of being fired.
