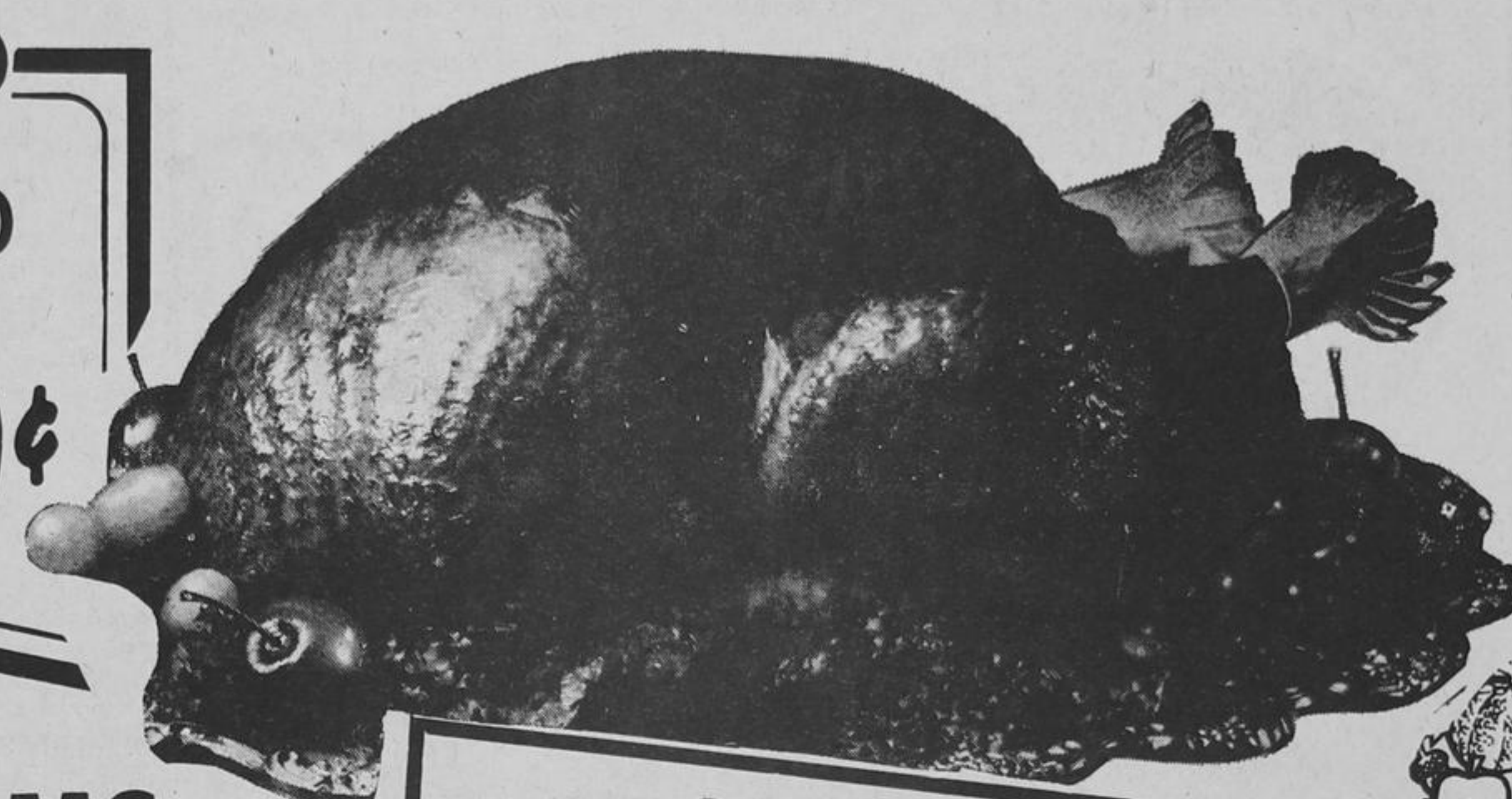

Board says director may use reserve fund

York County Board of Education is still working on this year's budget, and one trustee, anyway, is not happy about it.

William Laird of Georgina objected to a recommendation by fellow trustees Don Cousens and Bob McMonagle of Markham that the director of education be allowed to use any of the \$5,898 headquarters reserve fund to send staff members to conferences or seminars he "deems important."

There was no money budgeted for conferences this year and Laird said he didn't think the board should be "throwing \$6,000 into conferences now."

"We should be looking at 1978's budget," he said. Said Trustee Eric Baker of Richmond Hill: "It doesn't follow that we're going to spend a lot of money."

He then asked director Sam Chapman how he would apply the funds and Chapman said it was not his intention to spend it because it was available.

The trustees voted 13-6 in favor of the recommendation in a recorded vote.
