Take notice that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Markham on the 14th day of June, 1977, decided to designate the lands and buildings, known municipally as 37 and 39 Colbourne Street, Thornhill, Ontario, as a property of architectural and historical value or interest under The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, S.O. Chapter 122.

SHORT STATEMENT OF THE REASONS FOR THE PROPOSED

DESIGNATION: The lands and buildings comprising 37 and 39 Colbourne Street in Thornhill, Ontario, are recommended for designation for architectural and historical reasons as good examples of a type of building prevelant to the area in the middle of the 19th century. The double or semidetached house was a common sight in the early stages of Canadian domestic architecture, especially in milling villages such as Thornhill, This particular double house was owned by Thomas Hamill Robinson a carpenter, and he most likely rented it to workers from Thornhill's mills located along the nearby Don river.

The property and dwellings are important in terms of the local streetscape as the eastermost units of a series of houses between Yonge Street and Church Lane. This area forms the best preserved and perhaps the most typical section of the old village of Thornhill.


