## Spademan wins contract for disposal

Richmond Hill is switching firms for its 1978 to 1980 garbage pickup and disposal. The firm came in almost \$25,000 below the next closest tender from Markham Disposal, the company now handling the town's disposal needs. If a proposed amended refuse collection bylaw is approved, the cost per year will rise to \$282,784, still well below the budgeted figure of \$295,108 for 1978. Council was not unanimous, however, in its support of Spademan. Councillor Bill Corcoran said he had had "problems with Spademan" previously. Remarked Councillor Andre Chateauvert: "I'll reserve comment until I see the service."

## Still too many impaired drivers, OPP sergeant says

The number of motorists brought in for breathalyzer tests, this year, has already passed last year's number, according to Sgt. Tom Dube, of the Oak Ridges division of Ontario Provincial Police. He said that spot checks would continue in the region, and that police would continue to enforce the seat belt law. He said that motor vehicle collisions were down 50 percent this year, and credited the wearing of seat belts for reducing the figure. "But we're still getting too many impaired drivers," he said.

## Winning streak ends

The Thornhill Tailorform Peewee I's moved into Barrie Sunday and saw their unbeaten record come to an end by way of a 3-2 loss in a hotly disputed contest.

Thornhill had gone 13 games without a defeat. The first period was scoreless but early in the second it was David James moving Tailorform in front converting a Darren Burford pass.

Then came the fateful third period which saw Tailorform players in a continual parade to the penalty box, many times forced to protect two men disadvantages.

In the whole period they were only able to ice a full complement for little more than two minutes. Barrie knotted the count at the 10 minute mark on a disputed goal when it appeared they had a man in the crease.

### PENALTY PARADE

## "Is it true I'd now have to work longer to collect Unemployment Insurance?"

Yes. Parliament has decided that the qualification time should be longer everywhere, and that people who live in areas of high unemployment should be given certain advantages over those who live in areas where jobs are more plentiful. Which means that you now need more insurable work weeks to qualify for Unemployment Insurance benefits.

### "I can see why. But just how long would I have to work to be eligible?"

From 10 to 14 weeks, depending on where you live. In regions of low unemployment, claimants need up to 14 weeks of insurable employment to get UI benefits. This will only happen in places where it's easier to get and keep a job. In regions of high unemployment, claimants now need as little as 10 weeks to qualify.

### "Does this mean I'd get less or that the payments wouldn't last as long?"

No change in payment amounts. The UI benefit rate stays at two-thirds of your average weekly insurable earnings. The maximum is \$147, less tax. The maximum time for which anyone may receive benefits has changed slightly, however. The old maximum was 51 weeks. Now it's 50 weeks. But since September 11, the total number of weeks for which a claimant qualifies has more closely reflected the unemployment rate in his or her region. Right now, we measure unemployment by dividing Canada into 16 economic regions.



Maternity benefits of 15 weeks and the special one-time benefit (equal to three weeks' benefits) at age 65 remain the same. The same people still pay for the program in the same proportions, and the types of employment insurable for UI remain the same, too.

### "Would I still go to the same UI office to claim?"

As explained in the box below, you still go to the familiar locations for both UI offices and Canada Manpower Centres. Watch for changes in your area.

Unemployment Insurance has changed for everyone's benefit, including yours. All we ask is that you remember your obligations as well as your rights.

If the need should ever arise for you to come to us, we'll make sure you get all the UI benefits to which you are entitled by law. But you must keep up the search for a new job all the time you're getting those benefits.

The Unemployment Insurance Commission and the Department of Manpower and Immigration have become the Canada Employment and Immigration Commission. For a time, you'll still see our local offices identified as Unemployment Insurance offices or Canada Manpower Centres. When they're together in one location, they'll be called Canada Employment Centres.
