A public Hearing will be held by the Planning Committee of the Town of Markham to consider an amendment to the Official Plan of the Town of Markham for Part of Lot 11, Concession 7, 270 Wellington Street West.

The purpose of the proposed amendment would be to redesignate the subject lands from Residential to Special Commercial to enable future passage of By-laws to permit such uses as commercial parks, major office development, hotels and motels, large specialized retail outlets such as furniture sales, appliance sales, automobile sales, nursery garden centres and similar such uses. The location of the lands is shown on the map below.

You are invited to attend the Hearing and state your support or objection to the proposed amendment. Should you be unable to attend, written submissions will be received up to the time of the Hearing. The existing Official Plan, zoning by-law and land use maps may be examined at the Planning Office.
