

## Police Briefs

Six Concord businesses were robbed in one night last week; presumably by the same person or persons.

JRC Enterprises, Automotive Finishes and Supply Limited, Decoral Painting Limited, Concord Concrete Forming Company, Inmont of Canada Limited, and Thermal Printing Limited were all the victims of break and enter.

Items reported missing include an assortment of stereo equipment, speakers and camera films, power tools, transit levels and a 1975 blue Thunderbird.

The stolen property is valued at more than \$3000.

## MOH changes his mind

York regional council approved a 50-lot rural residential subdivision in Vaughan Thursday after the medical officer of health changed his mind.

Dr. Owen Slingerland had opposed the subdivision on 138 acres southeast of Kirby Road and Pine Valley Drive.

The planning committee made no recommendation on it but committee chairman David Fraser from Vaughan supported it before regional council.

Dr. Slingerland had opposed the project because the soil failed the test for septic tanks in three cases out of 13.

Developers are interested in subdividing 1,200 acres in the immediate area.

Dr. Slingerland said such a large development on septic tanks could cause problems but he withdrew his objection after learning that Vaughan council plans no more development in the area beyond the 50-lot subdivision.

Dr. Slingerland had to be called back to council from outside the region to explain why he had changed his mind.

He had received confirmation in writing of a

Vaughan "resolution" that the town council would support no development in the area beyond the 50-lot subdivision.

However, Vaughan is facing a regional plan to serve the whole area around Kleinburg with piped water from a new well to be developed at Nashville.

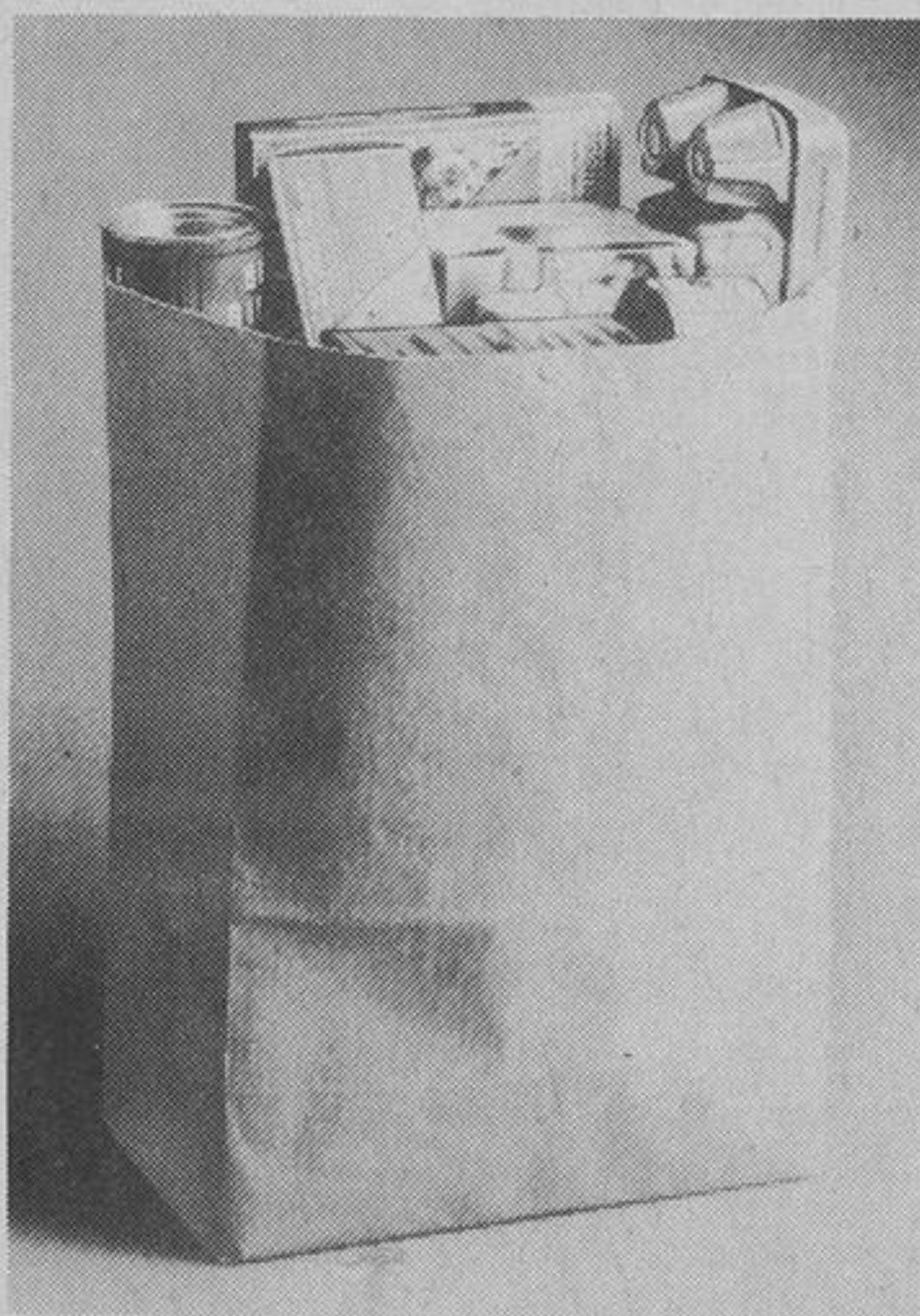
Town engineer Dick Kraft said he expects the consultant's report on the proposal in about two weeks.

Asked if the town resolution would be enough to stop development once the water system went in, Kraft said "I don't know".

The Vaughan "resolution" was actually a report from the town planning director adopted last September 19 calling for no further development in the area until all necessary studies have been completed.

According to Vaughan planning staff there are at least half a dozen applications for development in the area designated as block 48, which Vaughan council decided was suitable for estate residential development in 1972.
