57 ADDED

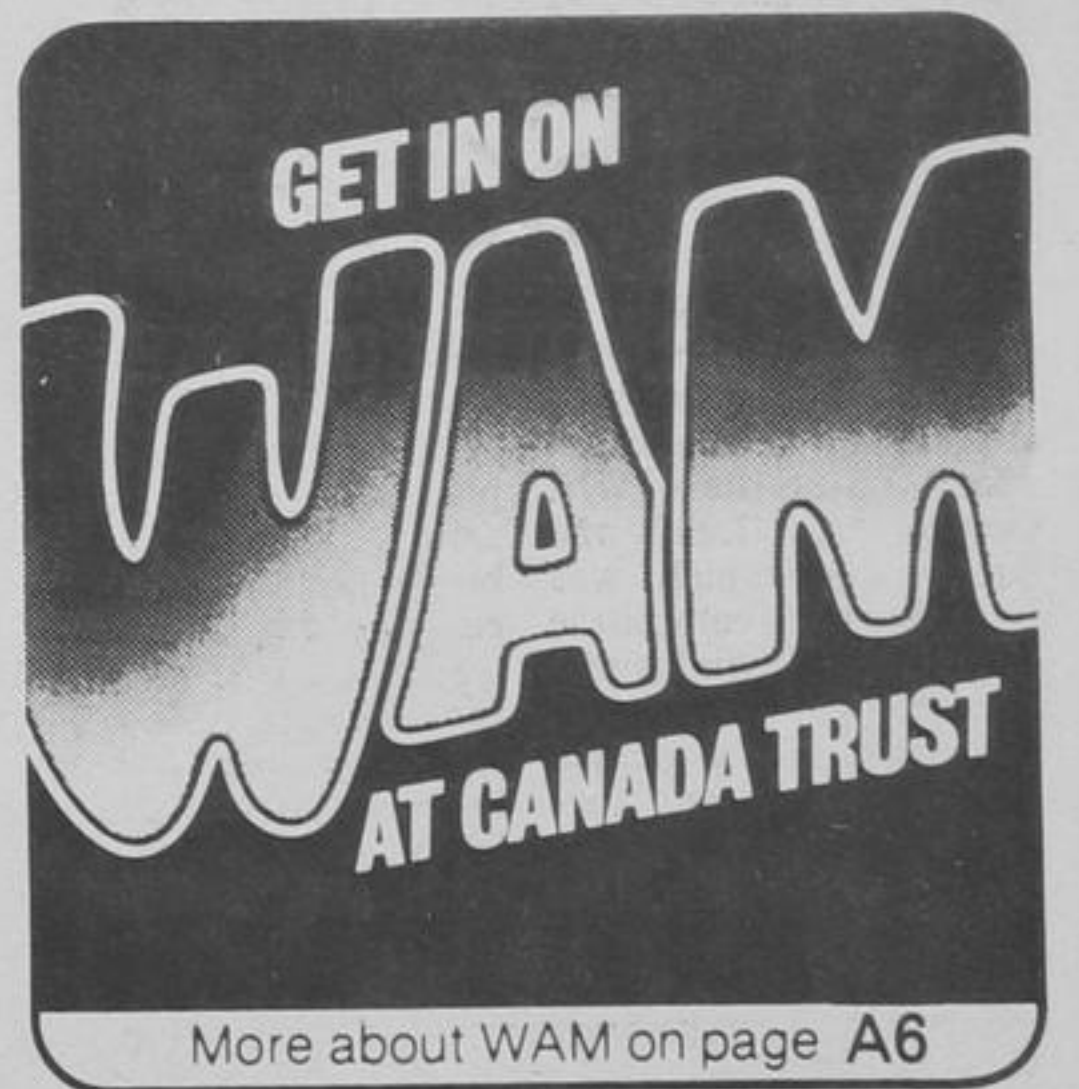

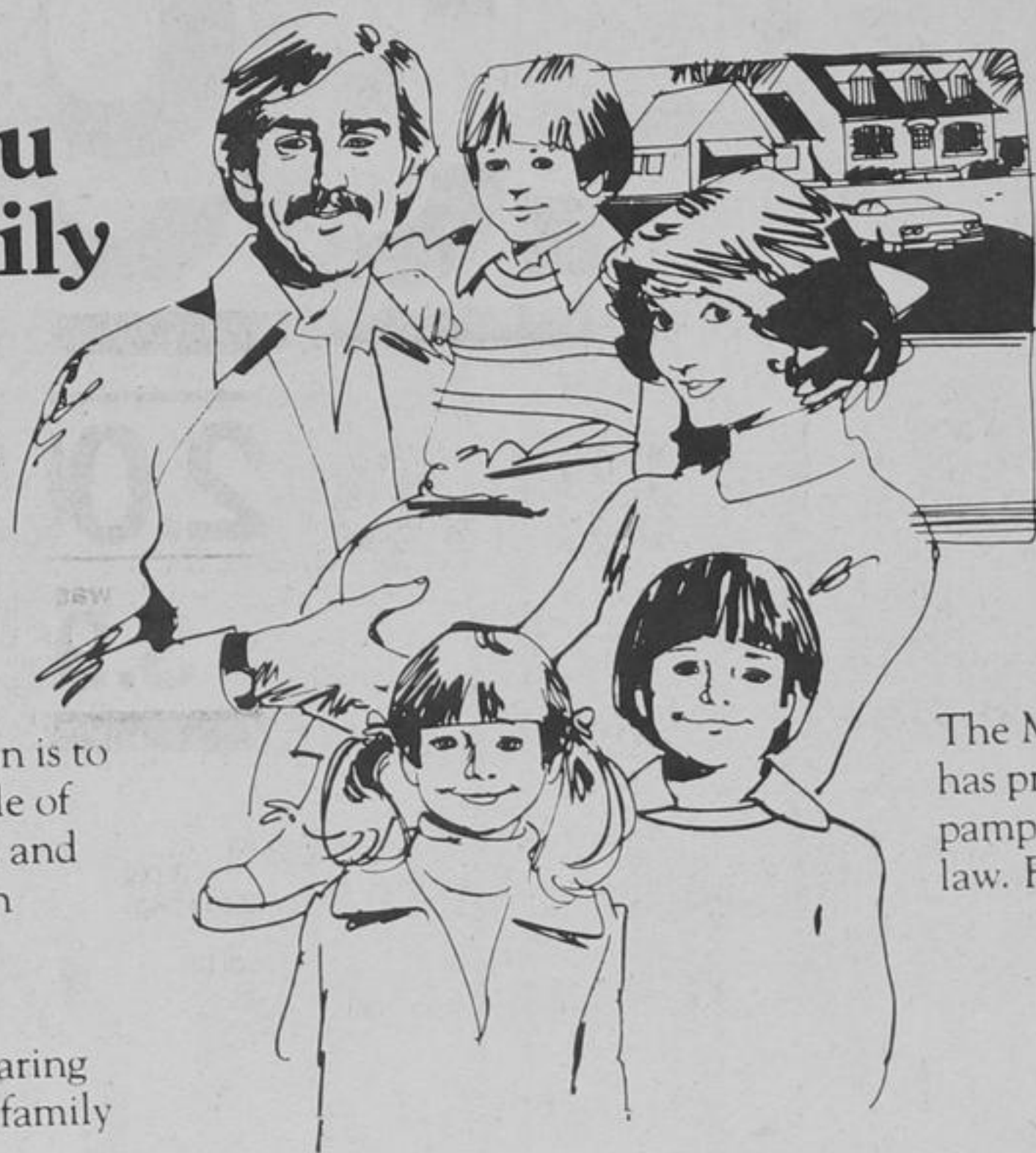
