

# Police News Briefs

## SHOE SHELF UNLACED

On June 9 at 1 p.m. a bank deposit bag containing more than \$900 in cash and personal cheques was taken from J. Singer Cheese Limited — The Shoe Shelf, on Yonge Street in Richmond Hill. The bag was recovered on June 10 at 7:30 p.m. — empty. Police are investigating.

## HEAT UNDER THE HOOD

On June 12 at about 3:30 p.m., Ralph Pearson of RR 1, King was driving his car eastbound on Wellington Street in Aurora. A fire started under the hood, destroying the engine, the hood and the car's fenders. Damage was worth \$3,000. The Aurora Fire Department was at the scene and extinguished the flames. So far, no cause has been determined.

## PARENTAL GUIDANCE ADVISED

On August 9, 1977, a woman failed to appear in Richmond Hill Court on a charge of an Immoral Theatrical Performance. A bench warrant was issued for her arrest.

Last week, on June 13 at 9:30 p.m., she was observed by the arresting officer doing exotic dancing at the Aloha Motel in Woodbridge and was arrested at that time on the outstanding warrant.

Ada Meixner, 47, of Thunder Bay was charged with failing to appear and was taken to 28 Division where she was held for a court appearance on June 14.

## ARSON SUSPECTED

On June 14 at 1:30 a.m., Donald Kaake of Hollywood Crescent in Nobleton, got a call advising him his vacant general store on the King Road at Highway 22 was on fire. King and Vaughan Fire Departments attended but the building was destroyed, resulting in \$100,000 worth of damage. Fire Marshals inspected the scene and the cause of the fire is under investigation.

## THREATENING MENACE

A man threatened Elizabeth Mets, 33, of North Lake Road, Lake Wilcox, with bodily harm while she was standing on the rear porch of her home on June 9 at 3:30 p.m.

One June 11 at 10 a.m., the same woman and her husband were confronted by a second man while they were in the back yard of their house. The husband was challenged to a fight and when he refused, both he and his wife were harassed.

The threatenings arose over a malicious damage which the assailants allege the man and woman are responsible for. The harassment has

gone on for the past 10 months. On June 14, Mrs. Mets swore to information before a Justice of the Peace and as a result, police have summonsed James Alfred Greavette, 25, of Silverbirch Avenue in Newmarket and Garfield S. Munshaw, 25, of the same street, for threatening. They will appear in court June 26.

## SWISS CHALET PLUCKED

Sometime between 1 a.m. and 2 a.m. on June 18, entry was gained to the Swiss Chalet Restaurant on Woodbine Avenue in Markham, through an insecure washroom door. Once inside the washroom area, a door was forced open and entry was gained to the dining area. A safe was broken open with a sledge hammer and \$400 in cash was removed. A cash register was also opened and \$50 in cash was taken. Police have no suspects.

## HOUSE WRECKED

During the evening of June 13 about \$1,000 damage was done to five houses under construction at the Bloomington Road and 9th Line. Destruction included knocking down brick walls, tearing out electrical wiring and breaking plaster and windows.

Investigations showed a 15-year-old Whitchurch-Stouffville youth to be responsible. He was arrested for mischief to private property, theft under \$200 and possession under \$200, on June 14 at 9:30 a.m. A search of his home revealed the stolen property. He was taken before Juvenile Court and remanded to 311 Jarvis Street in Toronto.

## FRUSTRATED THIEVES

Sometime between June 14 at 6:15 p.m. and June 15 at 2:45 p.m. Cashway Lumber Company on Steeles Avenue East in Milliken was entered by breaking open a rear door. Unsuccessful attempts were made to open a safe by drilling and punching the tumbler mechanism. A truck belonging to Cashway was then taken and driven north onto the CNR tracks where it was abandoned. At 2:45 a.m. it was struck by a southbound CNR freight train. Value of all the damage was undetermined.

## BEER BUDDIES

In the early hours of June 6, three men forcibly entered the Brewers' Retail Store at Yonge Street and Crosby Avenue in Richmond Hill, and stole 60 cases of beer. Through an investigation and with the help of Sudbury Regional Police, Rodney Athanase Thomas, 17, Denis Achilles Chartrand, 18, and Michael Armand Gagne, 18, all of Sudbury, were arrested for break, enter and theft.

They were returned to 28 Division in Richmond Hill and appeared at a show cause hearing on June 16.
