This six-car family can't have another driveway

The regional engineering committee last week recommended the removal of a second driveway for a six-car family in Richmond Hill.

Claude and Barbara Henderson and their four sons, Wayne, 21, Paul, 19, David, 17, and Danny, 16, all use their cars to drive to work or school from their home on Elgin Mills Road.

Because they work different hours, and have different destinations, they can't double up on rides, says Paul Henderson. But the six cars were not the

main reason for applying for the

second entrance, says Paul. Renovations were being done around the house which required the moving of the driveway. The family installed its own culvert which it got from a neighbour.

Then the regional engineering department ordered one of the driveways taken out, because of a policy limiting entrances to regional roads.

The Hendersons are upset because other residents of the same street have two driveways, they say.

The Hendersons disagree with regional engineering commissioner Bob Hodgson's statement that a turning area could easily be built in the front yard.

The construction of a turning area in the small front yard would mean the removal of a large part of the terrace, says

There is another regional bylaw prohibiting cars from backing out onto regional roads. The Hendersons feel it would be safer to have the two connected driveways, so they could always go out frontwards.

Paul estimates that all the family's cars put together would only be worth about \$8,000. His own two old Volkswagens, at the moment, are out of operation.

The engineering committee was concerned about the precedent that would be set by making an exception for the Hendersons.
