NOTICE OF PASSING OF BY-LAW

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of The Corporation of the Town of Vaughan has passed By-law Number 144-78 to designate the following property as being of architectural value or interest under Part IV of The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, S.O. Chapter 122: 10415 Islington Avenue, Kleinburg, Ontario

REASONS FOR THE PROPOSED DESIGNATION:

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE

The building is a fine example of the turn of the century rural railway station that has almost disappeared. It represents a particular type known as the Standard No. 5 Station that was built throughout the country. The outside of the station has been faithfully restored to its original appearance. The siding, windows and doors are original. The front platform has been renewed with timber construction similar to the original. Although extensive renovation of the interior has taken place, care has been taken to follow as close as possible the original design. The stationmaster's office and the waiting rooms are being restored to their original state, complete with ticker windows. Some of the stationmaster's furniture is original and efforts are being made to obtain additional items.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE

It has been stated that the design for this type of station building was conceived by Sir William Van Home. As was common at the time in rural areas the construction of this station provided the main stimulation for development in the surrounding area. As this building is now located in a semi-rural development, containing several buildings representative of the same era it complements the surrounding Village of Kleinburg and provides an important historic link to the early life of both the Village of Kleinburg and the rest of the Town of Vaughan. The preservation of this building, would assist in the historical appreciation of an earlier age when the train station was the heart of the business life of the community.

CURRENT CONDITION AND USE

It should be pointed out that the station building is not an idle monument to the past. It serves as the headquarters of the Kleinburg Scouting Movement, which includes Rangers, Venturers, Guides, Scouts, Brownies, Cubs and Beavers. These are very active groups in the community. In addition it will be available to other community groups.
