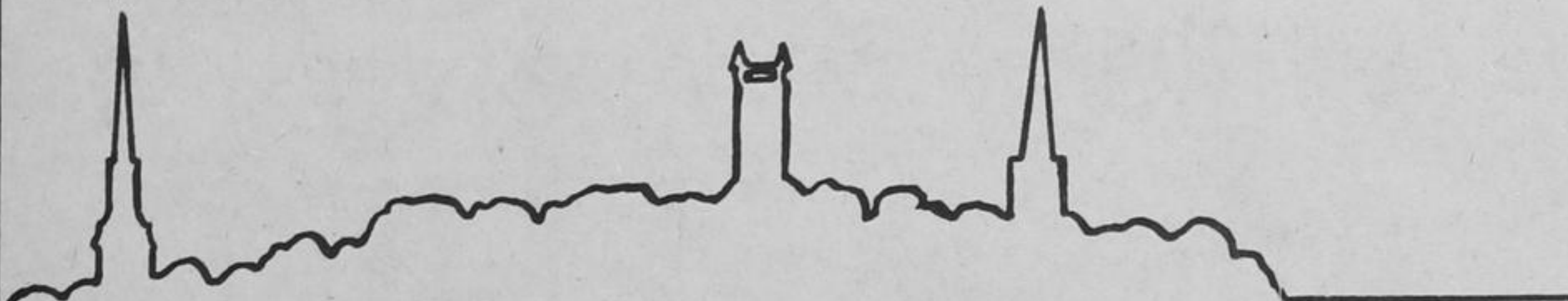


IT'S HAPPENING IN THE HILL

HOSPITAL AUXILIARY

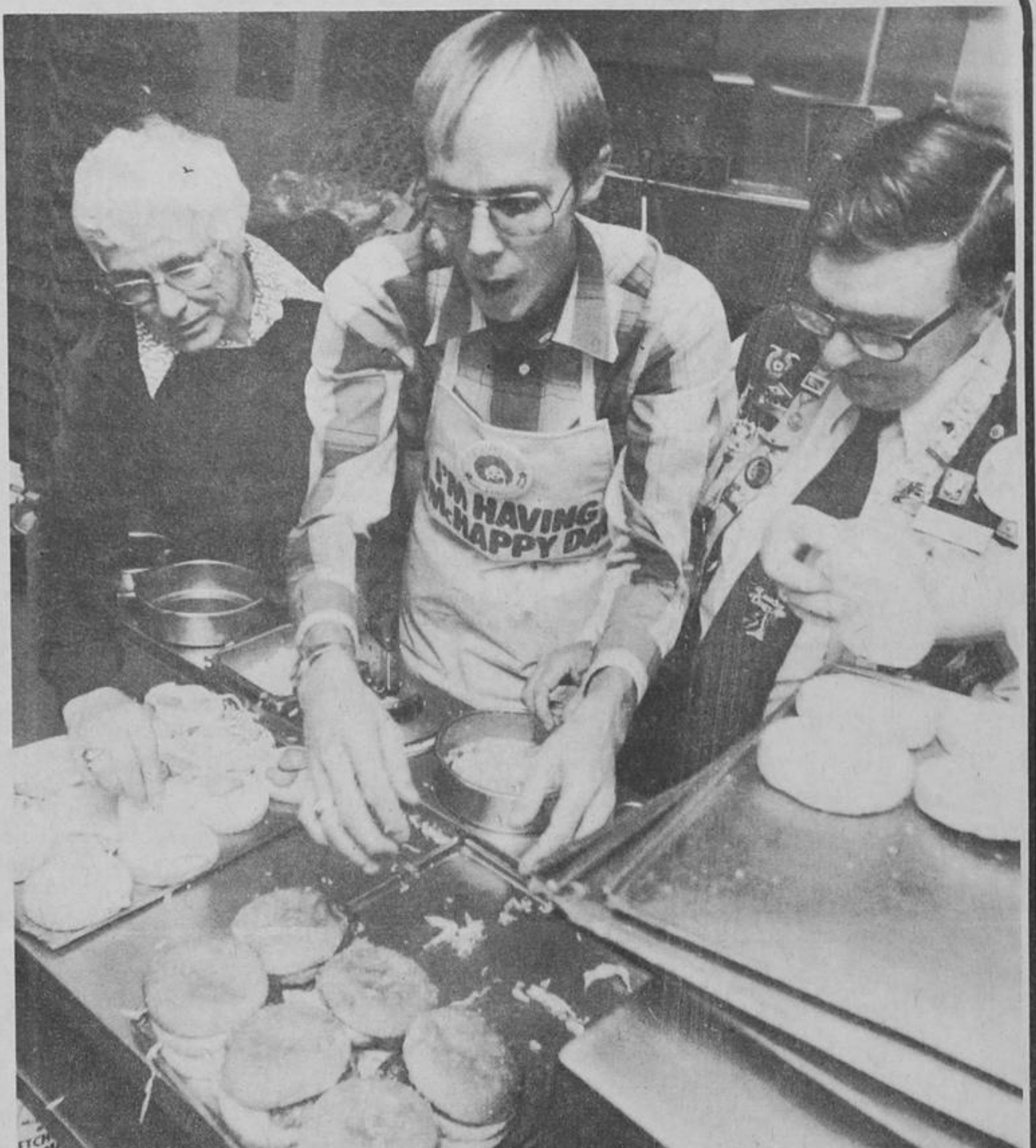
