

THE WEATHER AND THE CROPS.

The current season has been, so far, the most protractedly wet and backward that we recollect ever having had in this country.

Spring sowing was delayed, in consequence, to an unusually late period of the year, and even at the present time we learn that some farmers have been unable to sow their Swedish Turnips and some other root crops, owing to the wet state of the land.

The whole country surrounding Montreal says the Herald of Monday, presents a glorious appearance and bids fair for an abundant harvest. So far the weather could not have been more favorable for farming operations.

The Montreal Herald learns that a very well executed counter-feit ten dollar bill of the Montreal Bank, Toronto, has been set afloat. The one we have seen is numbered 19047, and as the note is lithographed, the probability is that the same number may be found on other specimens.

Sir Charles Wood, in moving the naval estimates in the British Parliament, spoke of the possibility of a struggle on the high seas between the ships of England and those of the United States, and said he had given orders for building vessels that would be equal to such an emergency.

The proceedings of Parliament possess little more than local interest. In the House of Commons, Lord Palmerston announced that the French Government had given no opportunity for remonstrance in regard to the firing upon a British merchant vessel, by a French war schooner at Bellisle, but had promptly expressed regret at the unjustifiable occurrence, and dismissed the officers who ordered the shot to be fired.

Judge Draper, who was sent by the Canadian Government to watch over Canadian interests, in the renewal of the Hudson's Bay Company's charter, has, according to the Globe's special correspondent in London, given it as his own individual opinion to the Committee of the House of Commons, that the H. B. Company should continue for a time at least, to occupy and rule all its trading posts as at present, for fear of the demoralization of the Indians by whiskey and competition in trade.

THE CROPS IN THE WEST.—The Chicago Press says, "We might fill a large sheet with cheering accounts of the condition of the crops in all parts of the country. The abundant rains during the last few weeks have been worth millions of dollars to all descriptions of crops. If favorable weather continues from this time the probability is that the harvest will be greatly more abundant than has been gathered since the settlement of the country."

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PERDIA. The text of the treaty of peace in Persia recognizes the independence of Herat and the whole of Afghanistan, and the British Government is to be the arbitrator in case of difference between these governments. A simple provision is made for the satisfaction of British honor.

LIVERPOOL MARKETS. LIVERPOOL, June 27. BREADSTUFFS.—The market was generally firm, notwithstanding very favourable weather for the crops.—Wheat rapidly recovered the decline of Friday, and closed at an advance of 3d a 4d per bushel. Corn quiet at about former quotations, except for white, which Messrs. Richardson, Spence & Co. quote 6d a 1s higher. Western Canada flour, 30s and 31s 6d; Ohio, St. Louis and Canadian, 32s a 33s; White Western and Canadian wheat; 9s 4d a 9s 10; red, 8s 8d a 9s 5d. Corn—white—40s a 41s 6d; yellow, 38s 6d a 38s 9d. Cornmeal—minimal.

PROVISIONS.—Beef firm, but sales limited. Pork nominal. Lard steady. Sales for export, chiefly for America, had a moderate advance in prices.

TORONTO MARKETS. ABRIDGED FROM THE COLONIST. Thursday, June 25. During the week we have had cold and gloomy weather, with frequent rains, although seldom of long duration. The account received of the growing crops in the immediate vicinity of the city are on the whole favorable. A large yield of hay is anticipated, while the wheat crop has improved very much of late. From other parts of the Province there are various accounts, the general impression, however, being that a fair crop of wheat may be expected.

The English news received since our last issue shows that, notwithstanding good weather for the crops, prices had moved upward, and wheat had wholly recovered the decline of the previous week. In New York, up to Monday, the tendency has been downward, but since then there has been an improvement, and the effect of the Persia news will be to make it continue.

The produce trade here during the past week has been unusually quiet, with a slight, but active demand and steady prices.

WHEAT.—The deliveries of wheat from farmers have been limited, owing to the unfavorable weather and bad roads. Yesterday, however, improved, the market was buoyant throughout the day at 5 3d a 5 7d per bushel, and 9d 6d being paid freely for good samples.

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THE OATHS BILL OF GOVERNMENT, for the admission of Jews into Parliament, was read a second time without discussion, although Sir H. Thesiger announced his intention of moving, in committee, that the existing objectionable sentence should be inquired into. Several members, headed by the Duke of Norfolk, have risen in opposition to the measure, resolved to support amendments to the bill, in committee, embodying the views of the Catholics, and to memorialize Parliament to frame an oath for all classes, irrespective of creed. It was feared that this movement would jeopardize the bill, and some of the Catholics opposed the interference.

A numerously attended meeting had been held in Liverpool, for the purpose of helping on the movement to obtain an increased supply of cotton. Speeches made and resolutions adopted.

Messrs. Newall & Co., of Birkenhead, have completed their half of the Atlantic cable experiments, and had demonstrated in the most satisfactory manner that telegraphic communication along the whole length of the wire, was perfect.

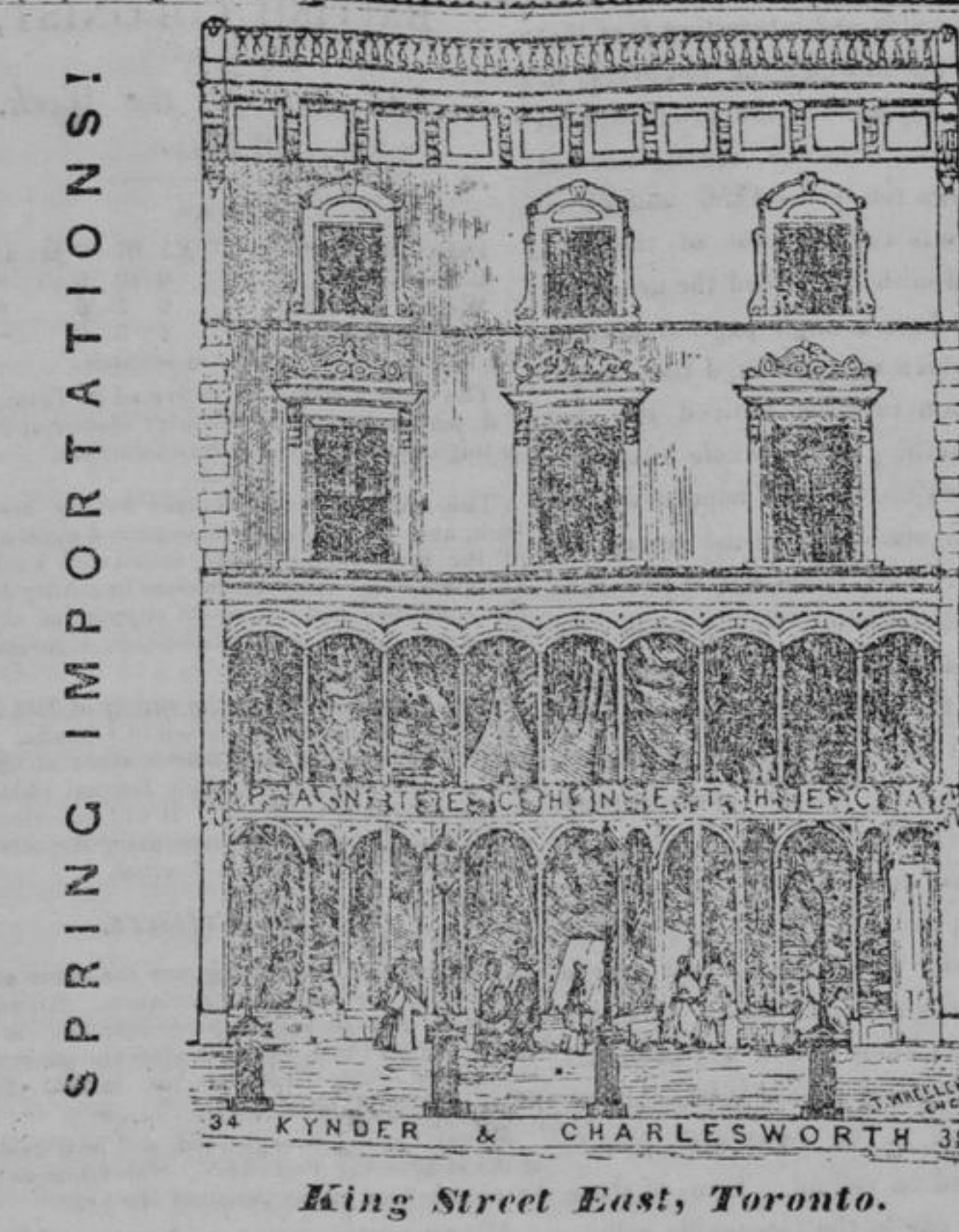
It is rumored that Sir W. F. Williams, the hero of Kara, is to be promoted to the governorship of Malta.
