TORONTO MARKETS.
ABRIDGED FROM THE COLONIST.
Toronto, July 23.

The commercial intelligence received from England since our last issue, still indicates a declining tendency in the breadstuffs markets of the United Kingdom, owing to favorable weather, and the promise of large crops. In produce during the week, there has been but a small business done. The supplies, owing to the busy season with farmers, have been but small, and as there is an ever active demand for all the products of the soil, prices are fully maintained, and for some articles an advance is established.

WHEAT.—The price of wheat has been unsettled, but closes at about the same figure as on this day week. The demand, as well as the supply, has been irregular, and prices have varied accordingly. The range of prices was wide, extending from 7s to 8s 9d—the greater part being bought between 8s 3d and 8s 6d per bushel.

There is at present an active inquiry for good samples of wheat, and there is more animation displayed by buyers to secure it.

LOUR.—The flour market remains in active, with a feeling of depression more evident than at the date of our last review. Prices are still nominal, and the following quotations must be regarded in that light. Superfine \$6 25 a \$6 50; fancy \$7; extra \$7 50 a \$7 75 per bbl. The amount offering is very small, and until after harvest no increase may be expected.

SPRING WHEAT.—is in light supply, and finds ready sale at 6s 6d a 7s per bushel.

OATS are quiet, with sales of farmers' loads at 3s 9d per bushel. By wholesale, 3s 5d is about the ruling mark for imported. Corn held firmly, at 4s 3d a 6s per bush. PEAS are worth 4s 6d a 5s per bush.

POTATOES have sold during this week at all prices between 6s 3d a 10s per bush, according to quantity and quality. For a good variety, 7s 6d is realized without difficulty.

BUTTER has not been brought in so freely and prices are again higher, ranging from 1s 3d a 1s 5d per lb. On Tuesday, 1s 6d was realized in a few instances. Tub, of No. 1 quality, is also not plentiful, and prices are firm at 1s a 1s 1d per lb.

CHEESE is in good supply, at \$10 a \$12 1/2 per 100 lbs.

EGGS sell freely at 1s a 1s 4d. The supply is still very small.

BEEF.—The hot weather continues to affect the consumption of beef. The market is depressed, and prices lower. The range for a good article is now from \$7 a \$8 per 100 lbs.—sinking one-third for shrinkage.

SHEEP \$4 a \$6 each. Lambs \$2 1/2 a \$3 each.

CALVES in better supply, at \$5 a \$7.

HAY—Old hay comes in sparingly, and is in demand at \$20 a \$25. New is in fair supply at \$16 a \$22 per ton.

STRAW \$11 per ton.

WOOL.—The wool market is again buoyant and 1s 6d a 1s 8d per lb for washed is freely paid; for unwashed 10d per lb. Sheepskins shorn, 1s 3d a 1s 6d each. Beef hides \$6 per 100 lbs. Calf skins 7/4 per lb.
