The poison of a rabid animal acts on the nervous system, producing convalsion and ing despatch :spasms similar to locked-jaw. The smallest po tion of the poison introduced by the bite of either a dog or cat will suffice to produce the malady. It is now believed that the broken off aiplomatic relations with Turkey. poison or sa'iva applied in direct con act with a sound skin will produce the ma'aly; that is without a wound or bite. One thing of the greatest importance and little known to the public, is that dogs previously healthy at any season of the year may, when enraged or taxed to a high degree, communicate the disease by their bite, - as a proof that dogs have hydrophopia without being inoculated. For instances are many on record of yard dogs going n al, though chained and without any kind of intercourse with any animals ca, a de of producing the disease. Putrid lood, J. C.
