Active exertions are being made to revive the races at Londondery. Men are now employed in repairing the course, and about £300 his been subscribed.

The cary of Berlin has voted a sum of £3,000 for a work of art in silver, to be presented to Prince Frederick William on the occasion of his marriage with the Princess Royal of England.

The French squadron has sailed from the coast of Corsica to Tunis. The measures taken by the Bey of Twois against the authors of the late outrages are considered insufficient, and other guarantees have been demanded.

The freedom of the city of Glasgow was to be conferred on Dr. Livingston, on Wednesday, September 16. The coreanony will be followed by the presentation of the money testimonial, which will amount, we believe, to about £2.000

The Leader, of New Brunswick. draws a very gloomy picture of the state of that Province. Trade is dull, and business of all kinds stagnant. The prospects for the working people generally during the coming winter is said to be very painful.

The Cambridge Chronicle says that a publican in the New Town, Cambridge, has a mania for the collection of old penny pieces, and he has managed to scrape together 14 cwt. of the coins, numbering 24,-948, and representing in value £103 19s.


