

TORONTO MARKETS.

ABRIDGED FROM THE COLONIST.

WHEAT.—Yesterday the market was in a state of stagnation, and only one or two loads changed hands, although the supply reached fully 3000 bushels, the greater part of which was either taken home again, or put into store. A few loads were sold at 3s 9d a 5s per bushel.

FLOUR.—It is impossible to give any correct note of the state of the flour market. We quote as follows:—Superfine 5s. Fancy 4s 5d. 50. Extra 4s 7s a 6s 25 per barrel.

SPRING WHEAT comes in very slowly, and is not sought after at 3s 6d a 3s 9d per bushel. It is quiet and nominal at 3s 3d a 3s 6d per bushel.

OATS still tend downwards, several bags having changed hands at 1s 0d a 2s. or bushel.

BEANS are in good demand, although the supply is limited. The highest paid on Tuesday was 2 6d (5s) per bushel.

CORN is in light stock and held at 4s 3d (8s) per bushel.

RYE is in fair demand at \$12 a \$16 per ton. Straw, \$12 a \$14 per ton.

POTATOES have come in more from farmers than by importers, although the supply by the latter has been moderately large. The market is well filled, and prices are not flushed fully 3000 for the best varieties, and 2s 6d for inferior per bushel.

EGGS 10d a 1s per dozen. Poultry is 1 1/2 a 2s 6d per pair. Ducks 2s 6d a 3s per ditto.

BEEF—Fresh is in moderate supply at 1s 2d to 1s 3d per lb, the ruling rate being 1s 2d. Tub or No. 1 quality is not plentiful, and held firmly at 1 1/2 a 1s according to quality. Of No. 2 the stock is still heavy, and it moves slowly at 8d a 10 per lb.

PORK—Fresh finds ready sale at 8s a 8 1/2 for small hogs per 100 lbs. Cured meats are very firm held, the stock on hand having run low. Mess is quoted at 20 dollars a 2 dollars per barrel of 200 lbs. Prime 22 dollars a 24 dollars. Bacon 13 dollars a 13 1/2. Shoulders are plentiful at 10 1/2 a 11 dollars per 100 lbs.

BEEF—The market is well supplied at 5 1/2 a 5 3/4 for medium cattle, and 6 1/2 a 6 3/4 for prime per 100 lbs, making one-third.

SHEEP 4 1/2 a 6 30 each. Lambs 2 1/2 a 3 1/2, and even 4 for very fine. Calves 5 1/2 a 7 each.

WOOL is lower in price, owing to increased receipts and a decline in the States. Floor wool will not now command more than 1s 3d per lb. Hides have declined in price and are now worth 86c per 100 lbs. Sheep skins, 1s 6d each. Calf skins 7s per lb.

CHEESE \$1 a 1 50 per bushel, and sell slowly at 90c per lb. Turkeys 1s 6d to 1 1/2 per bushel.

FRUIT have been plentiful. Apples 1 1/2 a 2 50 per bushel, and 2s 6d a 3s 9d per bushel. Peaches 1 1/2 a 2 1/2 a 1 50 per basket. Plums 1 1/2 a 2 per bushel.

CHEESE—Imported American \$9 a 10 50 for common and 11 a 12 for extra per 100 lbs.

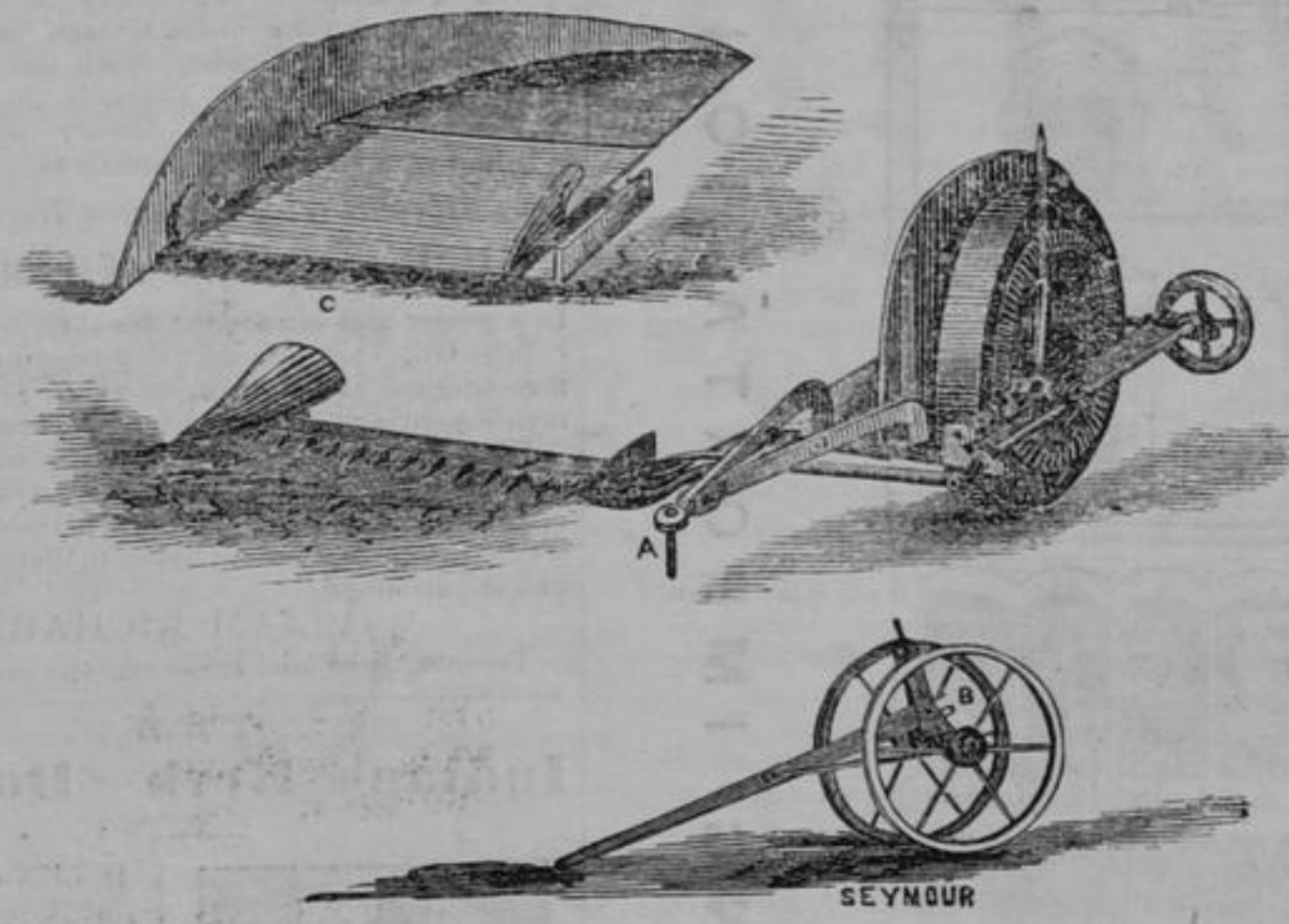
