

knowledge have been published, and it is a sealed book, says to Hartman, Collins, Jackson & Co. Where is our Clergy Reserve money? I say there is it gone? I am confident there are not six men south of the Ridge that could answer that question. Probably, Mr. Era, you could give us some information respecting this money? If we make inquiries respecting those men, we are treated with contempt by the Newmarket officers. And again, how do the Newmarket people see a tie fast Muncie a'lec on 'em? I tell you. The two days of the election, were piercing cold, and the electors, south of the Ridge, did not wish to exchange the comforts of their own fire-sides for a piercing north-west blast, merely for the purpose of electing Joseph, Emperor of Whitchurch, for another year, therefore very few went from this locality; but some of those that went, were prevented from voting by the people of Newmarket, who rushed in by dozens and took possession of the hustings, and kept the Clerk engaged until the poll was closed; and they actually elected our Councilman north of the Ridge, and one of their own nomination south; one that we did not want, but was forced upon us by a Newmarket vote; and when an elector condemned such proceedings, the Editor of the Era commanded him to be put out. All this I saw myself, and the Era will not dare to deny it. He farther says, Newmarket will pay into the Treasury between \$500 and \$600, and in return only gets about £35. Now, Sir, such deception is without parallel. He would wish to have the public believe they have only got £35; but if he would turn to the number of his own paper that contains the report of the Council meeting at Aurora, he would there see £50 to open Goran street, and £25 to be expended on the Town Line, and other smaller sums, which makes, I think, about £90; that is more than will be expended this year in all the rest of the Township; and this expenditure has been going on for years, while other roads in the Township have been neglected. The roads in and about Newmarket have been repaired; and this Town Line is soon to become the property of a Road Company, on which the public will have to pay toll. The road is of immense importance to Newmarket, so much so, that Erastus has expended what bit of eloquence he had, and it was precious little, at public meetings for the purpose of getting subscriptions to make the aforesaid road. I would give the public an account of the injustice practiced by a gang in this Township, of which the Editor of the New Era is head, but I intend to make it the subject of another communication. In conclusion, I would advise the Era to cease to do evil, and learn to do well.

## TORONTO MARKETS.

**ABRIDGED FROM THE COLONIST.**

Oct. 16th, 1857.

The produce trade during the week has been very dull, the supplies of grain being checked by the decline in price.

**WHEAT.**—The market for wheat, since our last report, has been dull and inanimate with a slight speculative demand, limited, however, by the state of the money market. Prices are lower, ruling during the greater part of the week, at 4s 4 to 4s 6 for the best descriptions of new winter wheat. Inferior samples sold at 3s 6d to 3s 9d per bushel.

**SPRING WHEAT** has not come in to any extent. It is worth 3s 6d to 3s 10d per bushel.

**FLOUR.**—There has been several small transactions noted during the week, generally on Montreal account. Prices are much lower than on this day week, and may now be accurately named at \$4 4 to 25 for superfine, \$4 50 for fancy, \$4 75 to 5 for extra per barrel. Even these prices would be sustained with difficulty if the receipts should increase, as the demand is very light, and except for home use, not at all urgent.

**BARLEY** dull at 2s 7d to 3s per bushel.

Oats coming in freely from farmers, and bringing from 1s 4d to 1s 9d per bushel. The latter is the asking price by wholesale holders.

**HAY** \$14 a \$16 per ton for good, and \$10 for inferior. Straw \$8 a 9d.

**POTATOES** in fair supply at 3s a 3s 6d per bushel.

**FRUIT.**—Apples \$11 a \$2 per barrel—2s 6d a 4s per bushel. Pears \$3 a \$4 per barrel. Peaches \$2 a \$2 1/2 for inferior, and \$2 a \$2 1/2 for the best varieties. Quinces \$5 per barrel wholesale.

**BUTTER.**—Fresh is 2d a 1s 3d per lb. Tub, of No 1 quality, 10 a 1s by the firkin. EGGS 10d a 1s per doz.

**POULTRY** 1s 6d a 2s 6d per pair.

**DUCKS** 2s 5d a 3s 1d per pair. Turkeys 2s 6d a 5s each.

**FRESH PORK** \$7 per 100 lbs, and not in large supply. The supply of mess is exhausted, and prices are nominal. Prime is held firmly at \$23 a \$24 per cwt of 200 lbs. Dried meats generally are scarce, and firm at quotations.

**BEEF** has improved in price for the finer descriptions, \$7 per 100 lbs having been paid. Rates range from that down to \$5 for common.

**ARRIVAL OF THE ATLANTIC**

We clip the following items which appear in the telegraphic report of the Atlantic news which arrived at New York on the 12th inst.

Marital law had been proclaimed at Delhi.

Paris paper contain a rumor that serious discussions exist between Lord Clarendon, Governor General, and Sir Colin Campbell, the commander-in-chief. Lord Elgin sided with the latter, and was also supported by public opinion.

There out of Gen. Havealeck having reached Lucknow was doubted, and his position was reported as a precarious one. An officer reports that he saw the end of Nana Sahib, and his family, who took to a boat on the Ganges and were swamped.
