News Items.

Five thousand more troops are ready to embark for India, and 10,000 additional militia had been embodied.

The difficulties in the way of sending troops to India by the way of Suez has now been entirely removed.

The Bank of England has given the East India Company one million sterling of a loan on the security of Indian Bonds.

A Russian 84 gun-ship had been captured in the Gulf of Finland, and 147 lives lost, including the admiral.

Mr. Armstrong's pump-making establishment, in Westville, together with its contents, were destroyed by fire a few days ago.

There is no later news from India, but the Paris journals assert that the rebels are under European generalship and the accounts are more gloomy.

We see it rumored in a Montreal paper that the Grand Trunk Railway has £60,000 of sterling exchange returned, under protest, sold to the Bank of Upper Canada.

Nothing to Do.—It is said that there are now laid up in the vicinity of Buffalo about 100 boats, which have been halted off the Canal, in consequence of the scarcity of freights.

The marriage of the Princess Royal is fixed for the 18th January, and the 3rd February is mentioned as the day of their entry into Berlin. Prince Frederick William will pay a visit to her Majesty in November.

A Tennessee paper records the manufacture of a wine expressed from the juice of the tomato. Its ingredients are the pure juice of the tomato and sugar, and it much resembles champagne.

Troops.—The Quebec "Chronicle" says that the "Vulcan" (6) iron screw steam troop ship, Commander Scudder, from Portsmouth, arrived in Quebec on the 8th inst., to embark the 13th regiment, ordered to England.

Wolves were never known to have been so numerous in the township of Essex, and adjoining townships, as at the present time. They have destroyed several sheep, and their howling at night is said to be of the most hideous character.

We (Montreal "Gazette") are sorry to learn that some of the manufacturing establishments at the canal have deemed it necessary to discharge a part of their men. It may cause hardship to these to be thrown out of work at this season.

The "Northern Whig," Belfast, Ireland, says:—"Steps have been taken to erect a one-hundred-ton steam engine at the works of the Belfast commentator and distinguished ironman, Dr. Clarke; and Portmahon has been appropriately chosen as its site."

The Rev. Mr. Cook of Kilmory Scotland, died at Kilmory manse, on Saturday the 19th of September. He was ordained to the charge of Kilmory in the year 1815, he having succeeded Dr. Chalmers after his translation to the Free Church of Glasgow.

SELECTION.—In consequence of the wholesale selection of women on board the American emigrant ships, the New York Commissioners of emigration have begun to publish the names of the captains of ships in which such selections have occurred.

The lumber season in Michigan has been unusually prosperous. It is estimated that 20,000,000 feet of logs kept back last season by the

drouth have been got out, in addition to a very liberal amount in current operations. Chicago is now the largest market for Michigan lumber, and Albany comes next.

Pearl mussels have been discovered in the Danu River, in Texas. One gentleman, living near Fort Marion, has employed ten men to dig for these mussels, and has obtained ten thousand pearls, one of the size of a rifle ball. Specimens have been sent to New York and New Orleans, to ascertain their real value.

The London "Times" estimates the gold and silver of the United States to England alone at £100,000,000 or \$5,000,000,000, which at 74 per cent. obliges America to pay, if all sold annually, a sum of no less than \$2,700,000,000 in gold and silver, or nearly as much as the gold proceeds from California, which are thus virtually lost to the Union.

A hollow receptacle for paper and valuable documents has been devised, to be thrown over-board in case of a disaster at sea, and designed to float until it is picked up or floats ashore. It is made in globe form, of brass or copper, and the opening is filled with a screw cap, easily adjusted, and air tight. A model is exhibited at the New York Exchange, where it attracts much attention.

A POXY SHOD WITH GOLD.—There are now on view, in Sydney, a set of shoes made of solid native gold, weighing 24 ounces, and worth about £700. They were made for the favorite pony of a gentleman (now deceased) who resided in New South Wales, and bear evidence of considerable wear. The precious metal of which they are composed was found on the land where the pony used to graze.—*Sydney Herald.*

EMIGRATION.—Information has been received at the State Department from a correspondent at Bremen, that from the 1st of January to the 16th of August last, the emigration from Bremen to the United States, 25,839 persons in 122 vessels; and, in addition, there were at that date between five and six thousand others for whose embarkation arrangements were in progress, and who were expecting to be shortly on board.

A MOUSE FOUND IN A CHILD'S STOMACH.—A few days ago a child named Tomlinson, of Green-lane, Sulcata, died of a lingering illness. It appeared that in May last the child passed a full-grown mouse, minus its head. The mouse had run down the child's throat while playing in a field near St. Peter's, where his parents then resided. After that time the child continued sallow and feeble until death, the immediate cause of which was attributed to diarrhea.

ADVANTAGE OF PUNCTUATION.—Punctuation, that is putting the stops in the right places, cannot be too sedulously studied. We lately read in a country paper the following startling account of Lord Palmerston's appearance in the House of Commons:—"Lord Palmerston then entered on his head, a white hat upon his feet, large but well polished boots on his brow, a dark cloud in his hand, his faithful walking-stick in his eye, a menacing glare saying nothing. He sat down.—*Punch.*"

THE POTATO ROT.—A gentleman in this city has of late been devoting considerable attention to the investigation of the causes of the Potato Rot, and has come to the conclusion that it is the result of the sting of an insect. He has watched these insects closely, and says that the decay of the stalks of the tuber follows immediately after their attacks. They sting the tubers as well as the stalks; and carefully conducted experiments establish the fact that potatoes which are sown when they are dug do not decay. We have in our possession two of those insects, and several specimens of the effects of their work, which we shall be pleased to show to those interested in the matter.—*Buffalo Courier.*

THE RULING PASSION STRONG IN DEATH.—The West Riding men are sleuth-hounds in pursuit of money. Miss Bronte related to my husband a curious instance illustrative of this eager desire for riches. A man in that she knew, who was a small manufacturer, had engaged in many local speculations, which had always turned out well, and thereby rendered him a person of some wealth. He was rather past middle age, when he be thought him of insuring his policy; and he had only just taken out his policy when he fell ill of an acute disease which was certain to end fatally in a very few days.

The New York Times says that the suffering of the poor in New York during the coming winter will be intense and memorable. Hundreds of labourers and mechanics are now out of employment with every probability that their number will be greatly increased soon and no prospect of their getting work or food, except by charity, until the spring. Is it better in Toronto? What provisions are our benevolent and charitably disposed making to relieve the wants of the indigent and unemployed here during the coming gloomy season?—*Colonist.*
