

ARRIVAL OF THE "BALTIC."

New York, Oct. 26. The "Baltic," with dates from Liverpool to the 14th, arrived here yesterday.

The American ship "Lexington" was totally lost near Venetia.

Later dates from India have been received at London by telegraph per the overland mail.

Calcutta dates are to the 10th, and Bombay to the 17th September.

The siege train was expected to reach Delhi on the 3rd of September, when the assault would be commenced.

General Havelock remained at Cawnpore, but would be reinforced in a few days by General Outram, who had reached Allahabad with a strong force.

The garrison at Cawnpore was gallantly holding out and would be relieved by the middle of September.

Lord Elgin had left Calcutta for China. The China mail failed to connect with the overland mail at Ceylon.

Thirty-four horses ran for the Czarowitz Cup, and the first trial resulted in a dead heat between Priores, Elaklion, and Que n Bess. On the deciding heat, Priores, the American horse, won by a length and a half, amidst great cheering.

The value of the stakes exceeded £2,000. The American horse, Leconte, is dead.

An excessive money pressure prevailed in London and a further advance in the rate of discount by the Bank of England was anticipated. Consols have fluctuated greatly.

The Bank of Dublin has advanced its rate of discount to seven per cent, and the Bank of France to 6 1/2 per cent. The money pressure in Vienna is also severe.

The firm of Ross, Mitchell & Co., Canadian firm in London had failed. Their liabilities were £250,000 but their assets were large.

J. Monteith & Co., and other Glasgow firms, had also suspended with liabilities to large amounts.

The military camp at Chalons has been raised.

A meeting between the Emperors of France and Austria is still talked about.

The ministerial crisis at Madrid continued. Bravo Murillo had refused to form one of the Ministry.

Anticipations of further disturbances, were entertained.

The King of Prussia was slightly better, but his condition was still very critical.

The despatches from India state that General Nicholson had defeated the rebels at Majajgar with the loss of their guns.

General Havelock has also defeated the rebels near Bithoor.

On the 16th of August the garrison at Lucknow made a gallant and victorious sortie, capturing the guns of the mutineers and also a supply of provisions.

The Singapore mutineers had been again defeated by Major Eyre.

The rebels were threatening Allahabad and Benares.

Large bodies of troops were marching from Calcutta to Allahabad. Troops were also arriving at Calcutta from England.

Their transport having been effected with great rapidity.

A despatch to the London Post, says that the British forces had attacked Lucknow Castle, spiked the guns, and inflicted a heavy loss upon the enemy.

The "Baltic" brings 72,000 pounds sterling, and 160 passengers.

The steamer "Red Jacket," from Australia, had arrived at Southampton with 70,000 ounces of gold.

LIVERPOOL, Oct. 13th. The market is quiet and all descriptions have slightly declined.

Flour has been dull at a decline of 6d on inferior qualities. Wheat quiet; Red is 2s and white 2 3/4 lower. Corn steady at 36s 7d a 37s for mixed; 37s for yellow, and 41s a 42s for white. Sugar closed dull.

LIVERPOOL, Oct. 14, 3 p. m. Flour closed steady. Wheat exhibits a declining tendency. Corn steady. Provisions closed quiet.

LONDON, Oct. 13. Flour closed with a declining tendency. Wheat dull and 2s lower. Sugar heavy, at a decline of 2d a 3d.

LONDON MONEY MARKET, Oct. 13. The money market closed decidedly more stringent. The Bank of England has raised the rate of discount to 7 per cent.

Consols declined considerably, but subsequently rallied and closed at 87 1/4 a 87 3/4 for money, and 88 a 88 1/2 for account.

DESTRUCTIVE CONFLAGRATION. PORT STANLEY, Oct. 26.

The "Free Trader," belonging to Hooker, Jacques & Co. of Montreal, arrived at Port Stanley on Sunday night, and laid up alongside the schooner "Isaac Buchanan," belonging to Messrs. Thompson & Hope.

About 4 o'clock this morning, flames were discovered by the mate, issuing from the south-west, which fanned the flames with such rapidity that a portion of the crew were obliged to escape in their shirts.

The fire soon spread to the fine schooner "Isaac Buchanan," which communicated to the warehouses, situated on the water side, belonging to Messrs. Williams & Thomson, G. W. S. Boggs, and Routh & Dawson, which were speedily consumed.

By this time the fire had crossed the road, and communicated with the North American Hotel, thence to Mr. Batt's, the whole of which, together with the offices of Messrs. Holcomb & Henderson, are utterly destroyed.

ARRIVAL OF THE "PERSIA."

The steamship "Persia" arrived at New York on the 28th inst. The following are the most important items of her news:

A circular had been issued from the Colonial Office to the Government of the Colonies, calling on them to look to the defence of their provinces, and not to neglect that reasonable amount of warlike preparations which it is desirable should be everywhere maintained.

A report was current that cholera made its appearance in the village of Hartford, near London, and that within a few days seventeen cases and seven deaths occurred.

The Diocese of Toronto has been reconstituted, and a new see created, to be called the Bishopric of Huron, with Dr. Cronin as first bishop.

A powder magazine, at Junduro, Persia, had been exploded by lightning, and over 1000 persons killed, and five hundred houses destroyed.

The Indian mails were received in London on the 15th. No new facts of importance; account all concern in pronouncing the prospects of the Empire more cheering.

There had been two arrivals from Australia, bringing £520,000 Sterling, in gold.

TORONTO MARKETS. TORONTO, Nov. 28, 1857.

In making a review for the past week of Toronto Markets we have little to do, as there has been scarcely any change from last week worthy of notice, and what little change there may be is not satisfactory to the sellers. Money keeps very scarce, and the banks are doing nothing in the way of discount to relieve the stringency, which accounts for the low prices of wheat, flour, and other leading articles of consumption.

What has been in good supply during the week, and the quality has been, on the whole, better than heretofore; but buyers are not plenty, therefore prices have rather declined. Still, from what can be ascertained, the prices now obtained in this market are better than in Buffalo, Rochester, or Chicago.

Barley has been a perfect drug throughout the past week; no lot of the brewers are fully stocked, and therefore are not willing to buy, except the very finest samples, at 2s a 2s 6d.

Corn has been very recently supplied during the week, with a steady advance, from 1s 9d to 1s 10d.

Wheat was in good supply, about 4,000 bushels and went off at from 4s to 5s 6d per bushel.

Flour, heavy supply from the country, and prices rather declining. HAY from \$10 to 21. STRAW \$8 to 9.

BUTTER, fresh, 1s 2d to 1s 5d per lb. Tub 10d to 1s 1d.

APPLES plentiful, at \$1 1/2 to 2 1/4 per barrel. EGGS 10d to 1s per doz. CHICKENS 1s 9d to 2s 6d per pair. GEES 1s 9d to 2s 6d each. DUCKS 2s 3d to 3s 6d per pair.

BEEF on foot, lower, \$4 to 5 per 100 lbs. PORK lower, viz. from \$5 to 6 per 100 lbs. SHEEP plentiful, from \$3 to 4 each. CALVES \$6 to \$5. SHEEPskins 1s a 1s 10d. BEEF-HIDES \$4 to 4 1/2 per 100 lbs. WOLVES 7 1/2 per lb. WOOL 1s per lb.—no supply.—Colonist.

THE COMMERCIAL DISTRESS.—The commercial distress in New York continues unabated. On all hands the manufacturers are curtailing their expenses and discharging their work-people.

In the clothing and millinery trades this has taken place to an unlooked for extent, and over two thousand girls have, during the past week, been discharged from employment. The failures during the last week amounted up to nearly one hundred and fifty, and among these the names of some of the best firms are to be found.

The celebrated and enterprising firm of Harpers have suspended payment, as well as that of the scarcely less celebrated house of the Apollons. Curious in the expense of every kind is now forced upon the community, and the theatres, hotels, milliners and dry-goods people, are those that feel the pressure most heavily.

The only redeeming point is, that food has not increased in price, but in hundreds of cases the means of obtaining any food has been withdrawn, a fearful state of depression and destitution may be anticipated during the coming winter. Already the leaf falls, the forerunner of cold blasts and a still further decrease of trade. It is to be feared that the bottom of this lamentable state of things is by no means reached.

THE CASE OF MISS MADEIRAINE SMITH.—STARTLING DISCLOSURE.—The public may be prepared to hear an astounding disclosure in a few days, in connection with the case of Miss Madeiraine Smith. We have been informed, by a most reliable authority, that one of the servants, in the house at Blithwood square, in March last, has just died rather suddenly; and that, on her death-bed, seized with remorse, she made a confession of the important fact that she was mixed with the coffee given to L'Angelier on the night of his last visit to Miss Smith. On the trial it failed to be proved that L'Angelier was at the house of his betrothed on the night in question at all, although the servant, who has now made this disclosure, was examined for the prosecution at the trial. We trust to be enabled to lay further particulars before our readers shortly.—Belast M'course.
