

amount of account paper. My creditors threatened me with imprisonment, and my temperament is such that I could not lie in bed a week, without cutting my throat. Under the circumstances, I consulted with my friends, and they advised me I could not expect any leniency from my creditors, unless the state of feeling that then existed in the community, and that I had better put myself in a position to control my property, and be enabled by so doing to pay my debts. I followed this advice, which, by the way, came from some of the best men in the province, and have been steadily engaged in arranging my affairs and paying my debts. I have not succeeded as well as I had hoped to do, owing to the fact that the affairs of my business were not only my own debts, but the large amount of other debts for which I am held. This alone has kept me from Canada, in evidence of which I have repeatedly offered to assign everything I have to any honest man for the benefit of my creditors in Canada, would they let me return and face that also a prosecution.

I have been in Canada twice since August, and as the press don't know what my business was, they conclude I went there for the purpose of digging a grave money and bringing it away; they strengthen their opinion from the fact that I went over in a quiet, borrowed a gentleman of the occasion. Further, they do me the honor to state that I exchanged a large amount of Canada Bank bills for gold with Messrs. Brown and Keef, brokers, of this city, which bills had a very earthy smell, "like as if they had been dug up." They certainly had been very wet. Hundreds of the best men in Canada know that the amount of money exchanged by me was a very small amount of money for me to have, and whenever it becomes necessary for me to show that the identical money exchanged by me, and referred to in the Toronto papers, was not the money or any part of it, stolen or taken from the estate in the Parliament Buildings, I shall do it, and furthermore, prove that I received the regular course of business from persons indebted to me.

In conclusion, I would say, owing to the attacks of men who knew nothing of me, or cared to know, who merely wished a sensation in some cases to screen themselves, in others to sell newspapers. I am a ruined man—character, property, all gone; if enough of the latter remain to pay my debts, I shall be thankful. I may have erred in leaving Canada to avoid imprisonment for debt, my friends may have erred in advising me to do so; yet God knows, I have always used my fellow men well—have committed no crime, and have tried, and shall try as long as I remain here, to be an honorable man.
