STORMING AND CAPTURE OF DELHI.

BOMBAY, Oct. 3.

Our information at present is more scanty than could be desired, owing partly to the dawk communication being untucky intercepted between Lahore and Mooltan. But the main facts have reached us from so many quarters as to leave no doubt w a ever that the place was assaulted with success on tie 14th of September, when a permanent lodgment was eil cted, that during the four or five following days further advances and acquisitions on the city were made, and that finally on the 20th the whole of the space en closed within the walls was in our possession. I should observe, however, that we have not received as yet such certain evidence of the tr. h of the latter part of this story as of that of the former.
