

# Legion Midgets lose in final game

The Richmond Hill Legion Midgets ran into a powerhouse Ottawa 79 team in the Georgetown tournament and lost the grand championship game 9-2.

It was still an impressive tournament for the Richmond Hill team which opened with an 8-1 win over Preston, 4-2 over Bay Ridges, and 6-2 over Milton.

Legion 8, Preston 1. Richmond Hill opened the tournament with a convincing 8-1 win over a hard-hitting Preston club.

The first period was indicative of the game as the Legion boys stayed out of the penalty box while capitalizing on two

of three power plays, to end the period up three goals to zip.

Hard-skating Maurice Delfabro opened the scoring for Danny Henderson. Randy DePiero made it 2-0 from Ross Cramer. Cramer picked up the third with two seconds left from Danny Henderson.

Gord Fournier opened the scoring in the second from Gary Boyle as the Legion continued to check the Preston attack to a standstill.
