SNOWMOBILE TRAINING

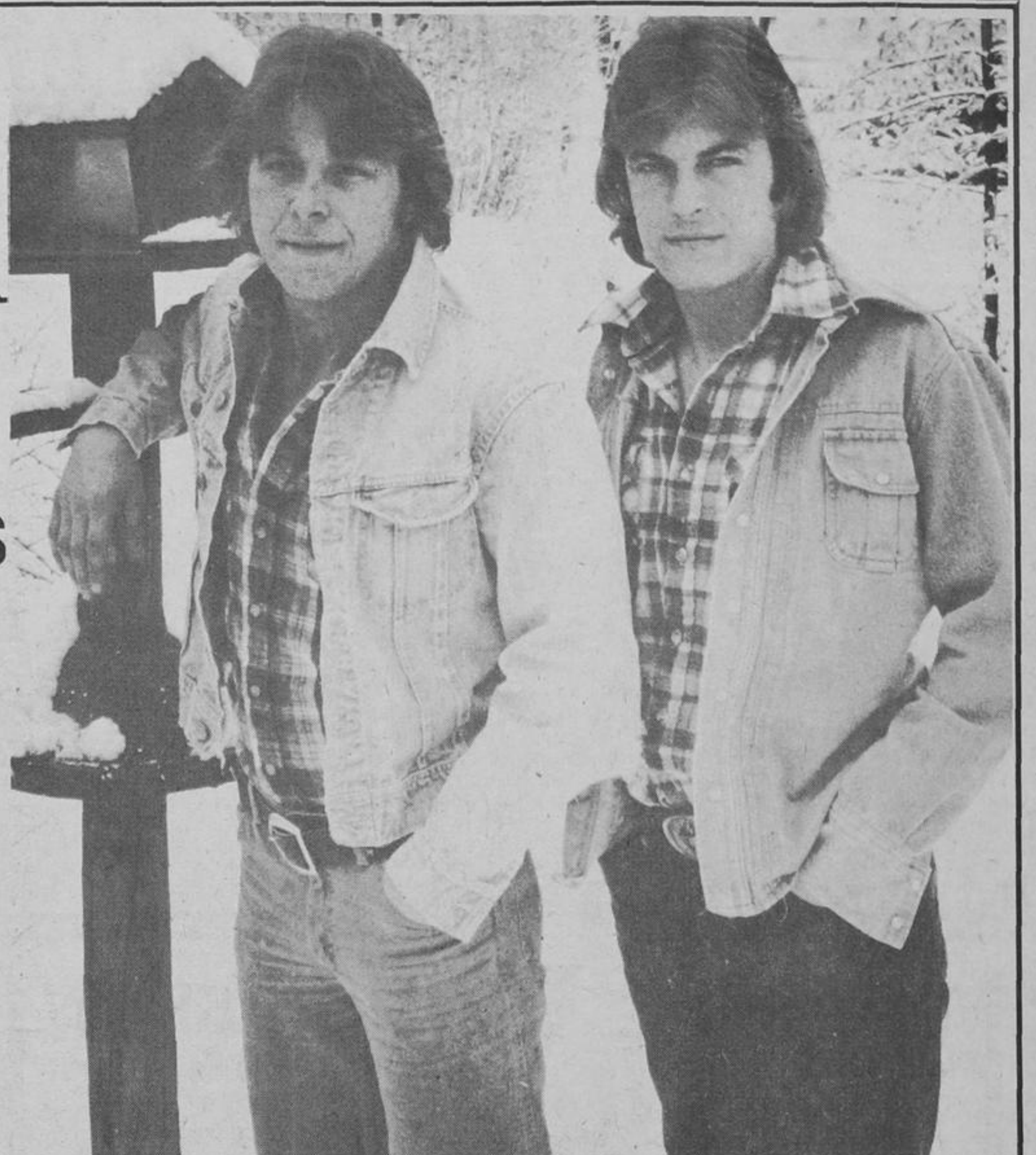
The York Region Snowmobile Association will sponsor a one-day training for snowmobile drivers.
