Choral singing is flourishing in York Region

A large crowd turned up for an evening of choral music presented by the York Philharmonic Choir, under the direction of Edward Luka, Saturday, at the Thornhill United Church.

The music represented many different styles, ranging from the 17th Century (Buxtehude's plaintive cantata "Jesu, Joy and Treasure") to the 20th Century setting of "Be Joyful In God" by the exuberant Toronto composer, David Ouchterlony. Equally varied, were

the instrumental contributions by the York Festival Brass with timpanist Zlatko Cetinic, guitarist Louis Lawlor, and the organist of Thornhill United Church, Gordon Fleming. The choir was at its best in the more robust and vigorous pieces. Lewandowski's Psalm 150 came off particularly well, as did the jubilant "Praise The Lord", a rarely heard anthem by Cesar Franck. Some of the quieter pieces suffered from a too emphatic delivery. The choir was just too
