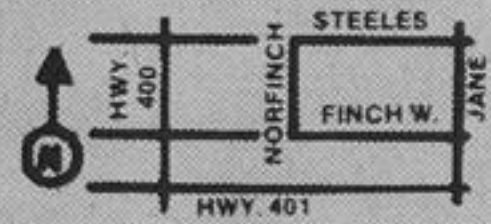

## Observatory finds its own asteroid

The David Dunlap Observatory in Richmond Hill has been credited with the discovering of an asteroid.

More properly known as a minor planet, the observatory has named the new discovery "Toronto". The name originally was to honor the University of Toronto but was expanded to take

in the city. J.D. Fernie, chairman of the U. of T. astronomy department, said the asteroid is just small enough to fit inside Metro's boundaries.

It is among 100,000 small, planet-like objects orbiting the sun between Mars and Jupiter and considerable research had to be done to prove

that it had not been discovered by someone else.

The new 'Toronto' is never closer than 200 million miles from earth, it takes 5.7 years to orbit the sun, has a surface temperature of -70 degrees C. and a mass of 20 trillion tons.

It was discovered as short streak of light on an old photographic plate which was taken for another purpose, Dr. Fernie explained.

The discoverer, Karl Kemper, who holds a PhD in astronomy, but works at the observatory as a photographer, then checked other photographic plates and found the same streak of light and began calculating an orbit.

An object that orbits around the sun appears as a smudge in a time exposure aimed at far more distant stars, said Dr. Fernie.

The next step was to look for an asteroid to see if it was in the spot where Dr. Kemper predicted it would be.

The Dunlap's other telescope, on a mountain in Chile, was used for the purpose last summer. Dr. Kemper then completed his final report and submitted it to the Centre for Minor Planets in Massachusetts which keeps track of such things.

The Centre confirmed early this year that Dr. Kemper had discovered a new asteroid and gave the Dunlap permission to name it.

'Toronto' is the first asteroid discovered by a Canadian observatory.

## Jefferson will survive a year

A survey given to the parents of Jefferson Public School confirms they will not let the Board of Education close the school until the end of June, 1980.

In a test to see if the community would accept having the building close at the end of this June, 45 families said they wanted a year's reprieve and 16 voted in favor of this being the school's last year of operation.

A similar situation arose when the board announced its intention to close M.L. McConaghy Public School.

It was given a stay of execution for one year and after numerous meetings of the Richmond Hill Study Committee, public discussion and research by the McConaghy Association, the school will be closed after this school year.

The McConaghy Association tried to show how closing only McConaghy would be ineffectual in solving Richmond Hill's shifting

student enrollment problems and the number of empty pupil places.

It's apparent the Jefferson parents will be put through the same sort of harangue, although there has been no indication of how much of a fight they are willing to put up.

Once the board finally decided on closing McConaghy, many trustees felt a sense of relief and thought it was better for staff and students of the school to know where they stood.

The second part of the survey asked parents if they preferred to send their children (those living west of Yonge Street) to either Crosby Heights (which becomes K-8 next September) or O.M. MacKillop. The results were 22-10 in favor of Crosby.

Three surveys were returned late, and Area 4 Superintendent Art Holden said they weren't used in the final tally.

He said they would have been included if they could have made a difference in the results.
