Councillors' pay goes up at short council meeting

In the shortest regional council meeting of the year last Thursday members voted themselves a six per cent salary increase.

The entire meeting lasted only 35 minutes with Mayor David Schiller of Richmond Hill and Councillor Michael McDonald of Georgina asking the only questions.

Councillor Carole Bell of Markham read out of a resolution from the floor and Mayor Margaret Britnell of King introduced someone from the audience.

Mayor Joe Dales said he opposed the council raises. Councillor Gord Rowe commented on the new seating arrangements.

Mayor Tony Roman

and Councillor Ron Moran from Markham were both absent.

The other nine members of council did nothing except introduce reports and motions and vote. Consideration of two documents related to the Regional Official Plan was deferred to a special meeting.

The raises, retroactive to January 1, brought regional council salaries to \$10,508.84, including \$3,502.95 in expenses.

Council also raised the regional chairman's salary by six per cent to \$41,048.

The raises had caused a flap when they came up for discussion in the administrative committee last month. Chair-

RHHS math department introduces new contest

The lifelong efforts of a brilliant female mathematician to gain equality have been immortalized by the math department at Richmond Hill High School.

For the past few years students have been offered the chance to enter the GAUSS math contest, which is set annually by the University of Waterloo and given to Grade 7 and 8 students.

This year, thanks to the initiative of department head Val Chow and instructor Roger Cote, Richmond Hill High sponsored the first Sonya Kovalevsky — math contest — its own math quiz for students at the "feeder schools" of RHHS.

The emphasis of the contest, which is 100 questions long, is not on competition or winning, but merely on stimulating young students' interest in mathematics. Both teachers hope to make the new contest an annual event.

The test, given to Grades 7 and 8 of four Richmond Hill public schools and one Separate school, is voluntary. The results are given out alphabetically, with the first five on top and honorable mention going to students who displayed

outstanding effort.

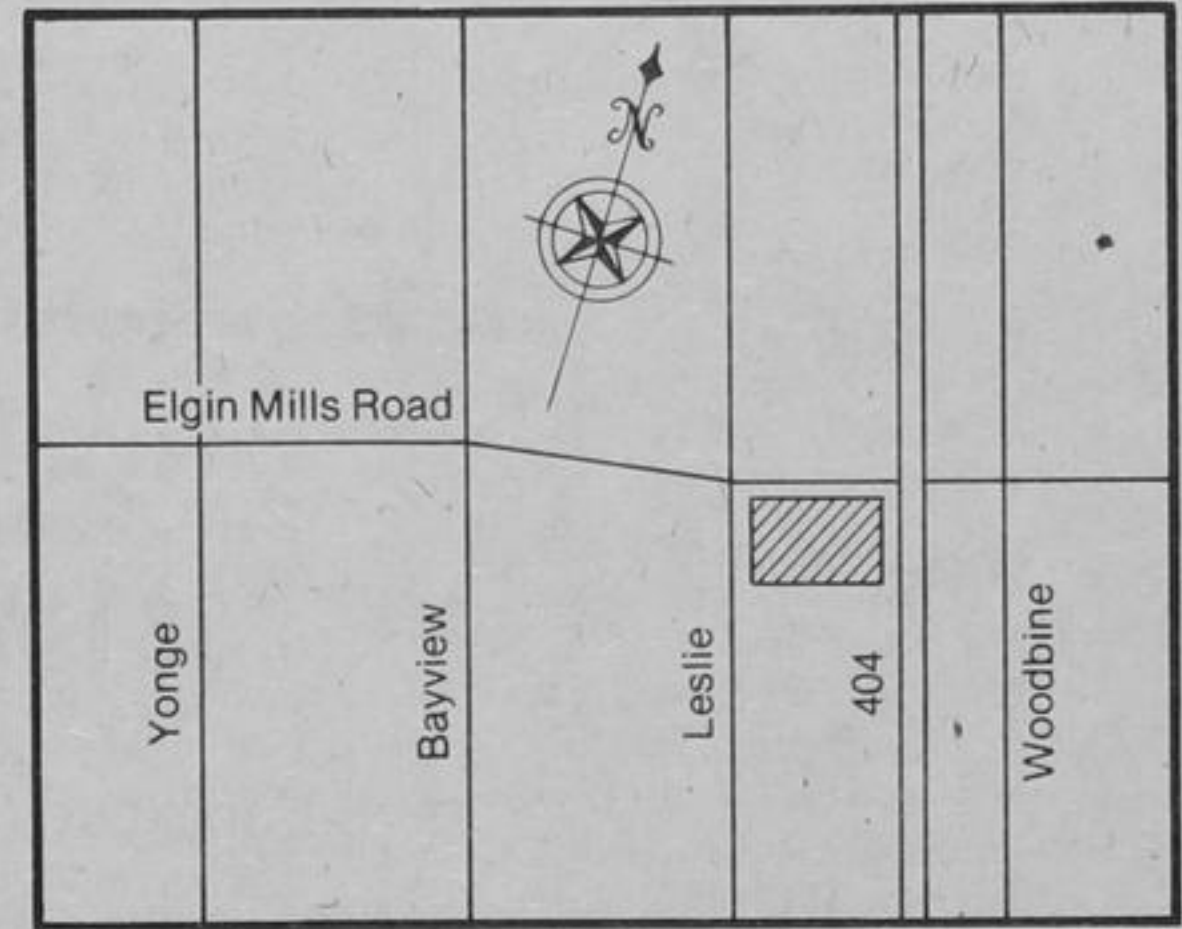

There's more to buying or selling a car than you think.

When you're buying or selling a car privately, a handshake and bill of sale doesn't mean the deal is complete.

If you're the seller, it's in your best interest to make sure the change of ownership has been registered properly with the Ministry of Transportation and Communications.

If it hasn't, all parking tickets automatically go to you. If you ignore them you could be subject to arrest for failure to pay fines. You could also find yourself involved in a civil suit if the vehicle is in an accident after the sale.

If you're the buyer, it's also in your best interest to make sure the change of ownership has been registered. Both buyer and seller should visit a Ministry of Transportation and Communications licence-issuing office and transfer the ownership in person.
